We Listen for God's Voice

Reading: John 20:1-18

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. ²So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' ³Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. ⁴The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. ⁵He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. ⁶Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, ⁷and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. ⁸Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; ⁹for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. ¹⁰Then the disciples returned to their homes.

¹¹ But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; ¹²and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. ¹³They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' ¹⁴When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. ¹⁵Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' ¹⁶Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). ¹⁷Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." ' ¹⁸Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Reflection

God of grace, open our eyes to see you.

Open our hearts to let what we see in you change our lives. Amen.

Easter is a special time of the year. Still in what some would describe as a post-Christian country, it affords a 4-day holiday with Good Friday and Easter Sunday still held with some sacredness, even if it is for the abundance of hot cross buns and chocolate Easter eggs. For Christians, it is the central story of our faith - the resurrection of Christ is the moment, the event that embodies God's story of abundant grace and everlasting life. This moment is the key to who God is, who we are and who we are called to be.

This risen Christ points to the truth that God's love has defeated all the powers of the world, even death itself. All the powers of the world do not have the final word, God does.

As with all celebrations, religious or otherwise, when they are tied to a date or particular time of the year, the celebrations wait for no-one. And sometimes the celebrations almost jar against the reality we are experiencing - it is hard to celebrate resurrection when we are still mourning the death of someone close to us. That was me at this time last year. My Mum had just passed away after a long battle and I was exhausted.

This year, Easter comes surrounded by the threat of illness and restrictions on our movement. We are unable to greet our friends with a handshake or embrace. Many of us have not seen family members in a while now and we are all unsure as to when we might see them again.

And yet...

And yet...

Mary encounters an empty tomb.

Mary comes to the tomb early to finish the work of preparing the body, a task left incomplete as darkness fell and the Passover began a few days before. But as she approaches, she sees the stone rolled away.

She runs to tell the others, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' (v.2) And she returns with Peter and another disciple, who run to the tomb to confirm that it is indeed empty - they see no body, no one else, just folded grave cloths. They believe that Jesus has been raised form the dead but they are yet to understand (v.9). And then they return home (v.10).

Mary, however, remains at the tomb, weeping.

'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him,' she says to the two messengers she sees sitting inside the tomb (v.13).

And then the gardener speaks to her, and again this time she wonders whether he is responsible for moving the body, 'Sir,' she says, 'if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' (v.15)

The gardener speaks one word, her name, "Mary". In that moment, Mary knows who she is speaking with.

Out of the depth of her grief, she knows it is Jesus.

I like to think that she is able to hold that moment, to treasure it, to celebrate it. But the story moves on quickly as Jesus tells her not to cling to him but to return to the other disciples and tell them what she has seen.

Whether we are ready or not, whether the world is ready or not, God breaks in.
God breaks through.

God has already shown us that love is stronger than all the world can muster.

So whether you are enjoying being tied down a little more than we are used to, or struggling with not being able to be with the people we love most;

whether you are continuing to work in a role that is needed to keep us all safe, whether you are working from home and juggling family life in a confined space; whether you are hunkered down at home or not sure what next week will bring, perhaps we can each spend some time that John's telling of the events seem not to afford - time to savour, to sit with the news that Jesus Christ is risen, to consider deeply what it means for us to embrace a life that believes that love has conquered all the world can throw at us.

During this time of enforced isolation, may we be beacons of love and hope in our communities. And may we take the time to ponder deeply how when life re-emerges, how different it might be.

Prayer for Others

Spend some time thinking about the people around you: who have you noticed this week, who is struggling, who has been a friend for you?

- family
- friends
- neighbours
- people who are ill or struggling or lonely
- is there anyone you could make a point of contacting this week pray for them

Give thanks for health workers, researchers, government officials - working to provide care, healing and organisation. Pray for them - for strength and compassion.

Give thanks for the many essential workers who work to keep our society functioning - teachers, child care workers, grocery workers, truck drivers, garbage collectors, postmen and women. Pray for them - for persistence and courage.

Pray for people who have lost their work - business owners, employees, casual workers, the self-employed.

Pray for our leaders - for wisdom and courage.

Pray for people in other parts of the world where medical facilities are less able to provide care to people who are ill.

Pray for the church - that we will learn to be the church even when we are unable to gather. May we be light and life in our communities.

As we settle into a new way of being, pray for patience and a deep sense of peace. God of Life - speak to us in new ways, nudge us into new ways of being. Without our regular groups and routines, help us to use our time wisely. May we take time, to listen to you more deeply.

We have seen our God! By God's grace and in God's own holy love, we turn our hearts to the divine that surrounds and upholds us.

Yet we are called, not merely to see our God, but to help make our God visible in this

world: to do the work of love put into action in service to the Body of Christ.

And so, we pray for all for whom crucifixion still seems a clearer reality than resurrection; for those who are hungry, or unsure when and where

their family's next meal will be,

help us to be your light, O Christ.

For those who are ill or in pain; those who are swamped in medical bills;

those who struggle still to receive adequate care,

help us to be your light, O Christ.

For those who are living with mental illness, who suffer all the more from stigma and shame and social exclusion,

help us to be your light, O Christ.

For those who work long hard days for inadequate wages, and for those who will not give up a bit of comfort so that all might have justice,

help us to be your light, O Christ.

For those who are living in places of violence and fear, where families have been torn apart, and trauma is a way of life,

help us to be your light, O Christ.

Help us to learn that even in the midst of despair, there may be love; even in the midst of fear, there may be comfort; even on Good Friday, there is the seed of Easter. May we nurture God's light and God's love into this world that is in desperate need of healing. May we be the active promise of new life in this community, and the blessing of God's love and grace to all who are in need. May we receive the Good News: Christ is Risen! Love has conquered death! and return to the work of discipleship with joyous hearts and praising hands. In the name of the risen Christ we pray:

Alleluia! Amen.
