Reading: Luke 24:13-35

¹³ Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁴and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. ¹⁵While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, ¹⁶but their eyes were kept from recognising him. ¹⁷And he said to them, 'What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?' They stood still, looking sad. ¹⁸Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, 'Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?' ¹⁹He asked them, 'What things?' They replied, 'The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, ²⁰ and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. ²¹But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. ²²Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, ²³and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. ²⁴Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him.' ²⁵Then he said to them, 'Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! ²⁶Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?' ²⁷Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

²⁸ As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. ²⁹But they urged him strongly, saying, 'Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.' So he went in to stay with them. ³⁰When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. ³¹Then their eyes were opened, and they recognised him; and he vanished from their sight. ³²They said to each other, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?' ³³That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. ³⁴They were saying, 'The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!' ³⁵Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

Always present God, open our hearts and hands to extend love and grace to those in need, following the example of Jesus the Christ. Amen.

Seasons of The Spirit, Resources for Easter 3, 26 April 2020

When the Prime Minister announced a few weeks ago that we were no longer allowed to meet in large groups and that we should all stay home, what did you do? What did you see happening around us?

There was the panic-buying in the supermarkets.

There were people who gathered at Bondi Beach - forcing the Council to close the beach. And then forcing other Councils to close pools, beaches and playgrounds. Here at church, we needed to notify the various groups that usually meet in our facilities. And we needed to attend to what that meant for us as a church community, particularly in relation to worshiping together and caring for one another.

We all had questions. How long will this last? What is this virus all about anyway? What can and can't I do?

Telling our story to each other is important in helping us to come to terms with what is happening around us. Asking questions is also important - as we ask questions together, we begin to put the pieces together. But then what do we do?

Let's look again at the story of the disciples on their way to Emmaus. Because this story gives shape to the way we work through the events and circumstances that we find ourselves in.

The disciples are walking away from an experience they are yet to comprehend. They are talking together about what they had seen and heard.

And then a stranger joins them - and they continue to tell their story together - particularly since this stranger seems to have no clue about what has been happening - there is always one who seems to have had their head in a bucket, isn't there?!

As they tell their story, this stranger helps them to see that all they have seen and heard and experienced, has its echoes in the writings of the prophets.

They open the Scriptures together and they begin to put together their experiences of the past few days with their understanding of how God is working in the world.

They make connections between their world and God's story throughout the ages.

When they arrive, they invite the stranger to stay with them and share a meal. They offer hospitality.

And as they share their meal together, as they break bread together, they recognise the Living Christ in their midst.

And as they recognise the Living Christ, they realise that all along, God's Spirit has been burning in their hearts.

So what do they do? They get up from their meal and head back into Jerusalem, another 7 miles, presumably in the dark, to tell their friends all that they have learned.

So where are we in this story?

We know how to share our stories - and we need to keep sharing our stories with one another.

But have we invited Jesus, the Living Christ into our conversations?

Whether in prayer, or as we open the Scriptures with one another, how might we open our hearts and minds to what God is saying to us?

Do you make time to talk together about how our understanding of faith speaks into our experiences of today? Can we take the conversation further than the fact that there was toilet paper at the supermarket today into a conversation about how we understand what God might be saying to us at this time. *Where are we seeking wisdom?*

Perhaps it is tempting, when we are spending a lot of time with the same people, to think that we have said everything there is to say. Or maybe you share space with someone you wish didn't talk quite so much! This is a great opportunity to have some of those deeper conversations that we seem to never have enough time for - conversations that take us deeply into how our faith speaks to our living and how knowing God makes a difference.

It is hard to share a meal with anyone outside our own households at the moment, but not impossible. You might want to arrange a FaceTime or Zoom time with another household, sharing hospitality and conversation.

I really hope that during this time of slowing down, of taking time out, we will listen deeply for the voice of God and that we will make time to share what we are discovering with each other.

I really hope that we don't come out of this unchanged!

The Emmaus experience also speaks to the way we shape our worship together. Whether we are worshiping at home or together at church, this experience of the disciples is reflected in the shape of our worship.

We *gather and share stories*, praising God and confessing those times we haven't got it right or haven't understood.

We open the Scriptures together and seek to understand more fully, making connections between the Scriptures and the lives we are living today.

We *pray* together.

We break bread together.

And we are sent into the world to share/to tell of our new understandings.

Whether at church or at home, in recognising the Living Christ, a very real presence in our midst, Christ's disciples get up from the table and head out into the world to tell others about what they have seen and heard. Right now, we might not be able to go very far, but we have phones and email and opportunities to remind each other and to tell our friends of the love, grace and hope of God.

Let us pray,

Spirit of the Living Christ, be in our midst today.

Whether gathered or scattered, come amongst us.

Open our eyes and our hearts to your presence.

Change our perspective, break open our lives as we break bread together.

Send us into your world to share your love and grace with all whom we encounter. Amen.
