


Easter 4 Sunday 3 May 2020

Living in Abundance

We Gather

Create a space for worship - perhaps with a small table with a bible, cross and candle. It would be appropriate to find a white cloth or scarf to signify the Easter season. Start by lighting the candle. The candle helps to centre us. Take some deep breaths as you gather your thoughts towards God.

Introduction

Christ is risen. Christ is risen indeed!

Today we are reminded of the God who cares for God's people - the Shepherd, the protector; and we encounter a people who gather together to learn together, to break bread together and to share everything they have.

Today is often referred to as "Good Shepherd Sunday" with the readings offering a number of reflections on the image of God as "shepherd".

When sheep need protection, the shepherd takes them into a yard. In the yard they can be fed and watered and protected from foxes or wolves that would endanger them. For those of us who are "locked down" at the moment, perhaps we can see this time of isolation as a time that God is holding us, protecting us, inviting us to remain within the fold

until the danger has passed. And while we are protected, we look out for each other and we pray for those who are asked to leave the fold, to go to work to provide us with essential services, to care for people who are unwell, to keep us all safe.

Whist we are unable to gather together physically, we are aware of our brothers and sisters who are part of our Church family across this region.

Each of us gathers in our homes, holding the worship resources, or looking at them on a screen. And we are aware of brothers and sisters in Christ who gather all over the world in the same way.

And so we take this moment, this time, we set everything else of our "doing" aside, and we still our hearts and minds, seeking the breath of the Holy Spirit as She breathes new life into our lives.

Acknowledgement of Country

We recognise the stewardship of the Wodi Wodi people of the Dharawal nation for the land on which we gather today.

From river to ocean from campfire to hearth may the First People who have cared for this land be blessed.

From breath to song from step to dance may those who follow your Songlines guide us on the journey to living honourably in this place.

A time of reflection and confession

Psalm 23 was also in the readings only a few weeks ago, just 2 weeks before Easter. It was the first week of us being unable to meet in person. That Psalm is so familiar to us, and is often the place we go when we feel ourselves in despair, "walking through the valley of the shadow of death". You might like to read Psalm 23 for yourself now.

And you might like to engage with Psalm 23 in a new way, in words that I think we have discovered again for ourselves in these past weeks:

It's Familiar...

When the community is a shepherd, then no one will want. Imagine everyone having a safe place to lie down, water to drink, education to restore the soul, and a meaningful path of work or retirement – for God's sake, God's sacred.

There are many dark valleys of illness, loss, depression, addiction or fear, but when there are companions – with a walking stick of guidance and a staff of assistance – then there is comfort.

Imagine the community's table set with the kind of generosity that changes enemy into friend, the greatest honour anointing a stranger and every empty cup of the most vulnerable overflowing.

Surely, then our breaking bread and all our prayers will mean something, and our neighbours' goodwill follow. No one will worry as much about personal God's-house-dwelling, as the community's hospitality to others – Day by day by day by day and all our lives long.

Reading: Acts 2:42-47

⁴²They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.

⁴³ Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. ⁴⁴All who believed were together and had all things in common; ⁴⁵they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. ⁴⁶Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, ⁴⁷praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

Reading: John 10:1-10

'Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. ²The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. ³The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. ⁴When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. ⁵They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers.' ⁶Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

⁷ So again Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. ⁸All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. ⁹I am the

gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. ¹⁰The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.

Reflection

God, in whom we find the love of a shepherd, a protector, a comforter, a guide, may we hear, follow and embody this love in all the days and in all the ways of our lives. May words and deeds joyfully testify to the abundance of your faithful love for us and for all. Amen.

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"I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." (John 10:10) Hear Jesus' words for you: I came that you may have life, and have it abundantly!

This passage from John's gospel is the first half of Jesus' use of the image of the shepherd in describing his "pastoral" role in gathering and caring for his followers. "I am the gate", he says in John 10:8 and later in verse 11, "I am the good shepherd".

The sheep know the voice of the shepherd and follow him out into the world. They won't get led astray by strangers because they know the voice of their shepherd.

And the promise of the shepherd is that they will be led to life in abundance.

When we talk about the universality of the gospel, good news for all the world, it is worth remembering that the imagery of the shepherd and sheep does not work for everyone. When I worked in Asia, sheep were not common.

But most animals when they are cared for by the same person day in day out will respond to that person's voice. Our dairy farmers know that! And the people of Cambodia who have chickens or even buffalo know how their animals respond to the one who feeds and protects them.

And for me this passage raises two angles.

One is about Jesus - the one who promises to nourish and nurture us, the one who promises to lead us to abundant life. When I go searching for fulfilment in other places and am inevitably disappointed, I need to be reminded of God's promise to nourish, nurture, protect and guide me into abundant life. Perhaps, for you, that is enough today.

The other angle is about me - as a follower - do I know the voice of the One who cares for me and protects me, and am I prepared to follow?

Do I spend enough time in the Scriptures and in prayer to know the voice of Jesus, to know the voice of God's Spirit as she prompts me and nudges me deeper into the love and grace of God's way of being?

And am I prepared to follow or would I rather do my own thing and wander off on my own? Perhaps I think I know a better way to go? Or perhaps I would rather stay safely in the pen and not go anywhere at all?

Jesus reminds us today - "I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture" (10:9) and "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly" (10:10).

There are some big questions confronting the church today, in the midst of this pandemic. Questions like:

How can we be church when we are not allowed to gather? How do we care for one another? How do we share the love of Jesus with our neighbours when we are not allowed to be in the same space together?

How can we share in those parts of our faith that hold us and nurture us, like Holy Communion?

And perhaps even:

When we are allowed to gather again, what kind of church do we want to be?

So it is helpful to be taken back to the foundations of what we call the church today, to Acts chapter 2 where everything was new and the church was just beginning to form its identity and shape. Acts 2:42 tells us that the early followers of Jesus, the early Christian disciples, devoted themselves to 4 things:

- teaching
- fellowship
- breaking bread
- prayer

As we seek to hear the voice of Jesus and to follow, perhaps we can refocus our energy into these 4 areas:

- teaching where are we seeking teaching? Here? Are we attending a Bible Study Group? Do we have a group of fellow disciples with whom we can discuss and wrestle with the Scriptures and allow ourselves to be challenged and stretched? Who are we offering teaching to? Are we thinking about ways we can continue to teach our children and grandchildren about the ways of Jesus and the love of God?
- fellowship it is impossible to gather at the moment, but how are we sharing in fellowship with one another? Phone, email, Zoom, Facebook, even the traditional pen, paper and a stamp! What commitment might we make to fellowship once we are allowed to gather again?
- breaking bread in the community of Acts, this was about more than Holy Communion. It was about offering hospitality around a meal. And it was about remembering Jesus as they shared the meal together. As we struggle with how to celebrate Communion while we are unable to gather, and we struggle with sharing meals together, what does this look like when we are allowed to open our homes again?
- prayer this never ceases, I hope! Again, though, the Acts church speaks of prayer as not only individual prayer, but corporate prayer, prayer together with other disciples and followers of Jesus. How might you foster family prayer time in your homes at this time? Are there people you can gather with to pray using technology like Zoom or a conference call on the phone? And then what commitment to praying together might we make when we are allowed to pray together in person?

And through all of this, how are we helping other people to recognise the voice of Jesus and to invite them join in the life-changing choice to follow Jesus?

This time of isolation has been really hard on some of the people in our community who are most vulnerable. May they hear the voice of Jesus in you - in your call, in your email, in your offer of love and support.

And may you hear the voice of Jesus and know life in abundance!

Let us pray,

God of Life, we have heard your voice calling us by name. As we seek to follow you, guide us and protect us, we pray. Prompt and nudge us to be signs of your love in the world.

As we are separated physically from each other, help us to reflect on what it means to prioritise teaching, fellowship, hospitality and prayer and help us to be willing to be reshaped and re-formed when we are next able to gather in person. We pray in the name of Jesus the Christ. Amen.

For when you receive us in your abode... *O God, our good shepherd, in you is fullness of life.*

For all of your people and creation... O God, our good shepherd, in you is fullness of life. Amen.

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Spend some time praying for people who are on your heart and mind - either in silence or with others who may be nearby. Pray for:

- family, friends, neighbours
- people you know who are ill
- people who are struggling financially or who are lonely

God we give thanks that this week we have heard that here in our community, the spread of Covid-19 seems to have slowed. We give thanks for the efforts of health professionals, community leaders, police, and all who have worked tirelessly to protect us. We pray for continued strength, wisdom and patience for us all as we come to terms with what it means to live with the threat of illness for some time yet.

We pray for teachers and students as they begin to return to schools. Protect teachers as they go about their work, give students a sense of purpose and peace, and ease the uncertainty and anxiety of families who worry for the well-being of their children and loved ones.

We pray for your Church at this time - scattered - yet united in your love. Nudge and prompt us, open our eyes to see ways in which we can be your hands and feet in the world today. Give us courage to engage with a changed and changing world.

Offering

In responding to what we have read and how we have heard God speak to us, we commit ourselves to breathing life in the world around us.

We pray...
