Creator God, we often lose hope in the face of widespread destruction from fires, floods, droughts, violent storms and other devastation from our changing climate, from the urgency of the needs, and the slowness of our response.

#### Creator Spirit of God, have mercy.

Christ Jesus, you call forth compassion and insist that we must be ready to suffer and sacrifice, taking up our crosses in your spirit of love and healing forgiveness. *Word of God, have mercy.*

#### Reading: Genesis 1:26-28

<sup>26</sup> Then God said, 'Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth.'

<sup>27</sup> So God created humankind in his image,

in the image of God he created them;

male and female he created them.

<sup>28</sup>God blessed them, and God said to them, 'Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth.'

# Reading: Mark 8:27-38

<sup>27</sup> Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that I am?' <sup>28</sup>And they answered him, 'John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets.' <sup>29</sup>He asked them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Peter answered him, 'You are the Messiah.' <sup>30</sup>And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him.

<sup>31</sup> Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. <sup>32</sup>He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. <sup>33</sup>But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.'

<sup>34</sup> He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. <sup>35</sup>For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. <sup>36</sup>For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? <sup>37</sup>Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? <sup>38</sup>Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'

# Reflection

Pslam 19:

<sup>14</sup> Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable to you, O Lord, my rock and my redeemer.

As I have pondered the readings, and reflected on being stuck at home for a few weeks yet, I simply want to throw out some questions for further reflection - for you to ponder, perhaps to chat with your family about, or reflect upon as you sit in the garden or walk along the beach...

The reading from Genesis places before us the beginning of our story - the story of God creating humanity in God's own likeness and then entrusting the care of the earth to us. How are we doing with that?

The words that are translated for us as "have dominion over" and "subdue" have been used as an excuse to denude the earth of its resources without concern for its sustaining. How does that sit with us today as we watch resources reaching their limit, species of animals, birds and plants disappearing, natural resources being polluted to such an extent they can no longer be used.

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And then along comes Jesus, asking us today, "who do *you* say that I am?" This is the pivot point in Mark's gospel - from this point, Jesus stops going from village to village and crossing the lake, and begins his journey towards Jerusalem.

His conversation with Peter and the disciples reminds us that there is no escaping from the narrative of suffering and death that leads to resurrection.

This path that God, that God places before us, the choice to follow Jesus, presents a paradox of life in all its fullness at the same time as we confront the pain of rejection and even death.

If we look closely, we see the same paradox in creation - in life that emerges after a bushfire, after a flood, after the winter has passed and spring begins to warm the soil again. As Wangarr says, if we look closely enough, we see the love of God flourishing in God's good creation. What of God do you see as you look closely...?

Creator God, you call us to remember our humanity, because in knowing ourselves we know you more fully. May we be reminded that we are your creation and that you call us to responsibility. In the beauty around and within us, may we embrace your ways and remember our kinship with all creation. Amen.

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#### Responding

Prayers of the People - prepared by Helen Laidlaw

We begin by reading something written by an aboriginal theologian – Deacon Boniface Perdjert. On this Sunday when we can't meet together and we are locked down in our houses, in our community, this reminds me how much I have and how much I have to share. He wrote:

"When I read the gospels, I read them as an Aboriginal...so many of the things Christ said and did and the way He lived, make me think of the good things of our way of life. Christ did not get worried about material things.....He looked on them as things that get in the way and make it hard to get to our true country. He was born in the countryside in a cave, like many of us have been born. He walked about like us and with nowhere to lay His head. He died with nothing on a cross. So many of our people die with nothing. .... He was strong on sharing. We do a lot of things like that. Of course He went a bit further. In the Eucharist He shared Himself as nobody else could."

Loving God – many of us have wept for the deaths, destruction and pain caused by the events in Afghanistan, the earthquake in Mexico, the fires and floods in Europe and the US. We thank you for our good weather, but we also must remember that in

the days ahead, we will need your strength to act wisely and with compassion. Help us not to become complacent and wrapped up in our own activities, and mourning what we can't do! Remind us to pray for all who are touched by these tragedies and be generous in our giving.

We are so fortunate that so far we have not had Covid in our community.

Particularly we pray for the people of Sydney after eleven weeks of lockdown.

We pray for the co-ordinators of financial and material support that it may be quickly and prudently distributed to those with no jobs and no way of buying adequate food. Help us to care for those around us who are isolated.

We pray for those making decisions about restrictions and vaccinations, and when the restrictions are to be lifted or reduced. Give them wisdom and strength to make good decisions.

We pray for the families of those who have died. We also pray for the medical staff who are treating the infected and that they find the resilience to comfort heartbroken people while keeping themselves and their own families safe. I want to pray particularly for those people who are resisting vaccination through fear and social media misinformation. Help them to understand that it is necessary to support everyone else!

We pray for the teachers as schools go back in in some areas and for parents and grandparents who are home schooling the children. Give the teachers the wisdom and skills to prepare adequately for this situation. Give the parents the patience and understanding that being away from your mates is difficult.

But our Creator God, we pray most deeply for the First Peoples of this country, who see so much of their history wiped out. Previously we have taken the land, and belittled their culture, refused to allow them to speak their languages. Help us to be aware of the prejudices we hold, and actively change how we act. And we pray for them as they face the ultimate challenge as Covid infiltrates their communities. Help us to find the courage to listen, to see, to feel, to name -

the pain and loss of all Indigenous peoples.

Finally we pray for our own government that they will realise what needs to be done to reverse the changes in our climate and care for the planet you have given us. In Jesus' name, Amen
