Take some deep breaths as you gather your thoughts towards God


Light Candle

Call to Worship

Psalm 138:

- ¹ I give you thanks, O Lord, with my whole heart; before the gods I sing your praise;
- ² I bow down towards your holy temple and give thanks to your name for your steadfast love and your faithfulness; for you have exalted your name and your word above everything.
- ³ On the day I called, you answered me, you increased my strength of soul.

O God, we have searched deep and wide for answers to our questions,

for solutions to our problems and for relief from those things that threaten to destroy us. And you have brought us here,

to the last place the worldly-minded think of turning.

Through Jesus Christ, you fill our nets to bursting and renew us in your Holy Spirit. Thanks and praise to you, our God. Amen.

Our Scripture readings this morning tell two different stories of the way God calls to us, inviting us to follow God's way.

So we are going to break it up a bit and I hope the readings, prayer and the song we sing will offer some new insights...

The song is "I, The Lord of Sea and Sky". Rather than singing the song lustily, perhaps you can speak the words as the group sings. The chorus invites a commitment - both about being open to hearing God speak now, and about responding - doing something about the what we hear. Perhaps, if you want to show the commitment we sing about, you might want to stand at that point.

We begin with the first part of the reading...

Reading: Isaiah 6:1-8 (Stephanie Pryor)

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. ²Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. ³And one called to another and said:

'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts;

the whole earth is full of his glory.'

⁴The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. ⁵And I said: 'Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!'

⁶ Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. ⁷The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: 'Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out.' ⁸Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; send me!'

Sing - I, The Lord of Sea and Sky (TIS 658) - verse 1

Reading: Isaiah 6:9-13 (Stephanie Pryor)

⁹And he said, 'Go and say to this people:

"Keep listening, but do not comprehend;

keep looking, but do not understand."

Make the mind of this people dull, and stop their ears,

and shut their eyes,

so that they may not look with their eyes, and listen with their ears.

and comprehend with their minds,

and turn and be healed.'

¹¹ Then I said, 'How long, O Lord?' And he said:

'Until cities lie waste

without inhabitant,

and houses without people,

and the land is utterly desolate;

12 until the Lord sends everyone far away,

and vast is the emptiness in the midst of the land.

¹³ Even if a tenth part remains in it,

it will be burned again,

like a terebinth or an oak

whose stump remains standing

when it is felled.'

The holy seed is its stump.

Listening for God's Voice

Reading: Luke 5:1-11 (Stephanie Pryor)

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, 2he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. ³He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. 4When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, 'Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch.' 5Simon answered, 'Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets.' 6When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. 7So they signalled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. 8But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!' 9For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; 10 and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' 11When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

For the Word of God in Scripture, for the Word of God among us, for the Word of God within us,

Reflection

God, for this moment, help us to put aside our every day worries, our feelings of inadequacy, and help us to hear again your call of grace and love on our lives. Here we are, hearts and minds open, waiting to hear and respond to your call. Speak to us, speak through us, and inspire us to live in ways that point to you. In Christ's name we pray. Amen.

Can you remember the first time you heard or felt or understood God to be calling to you? Perhaps you "heard a voice".

Perhaps you had a dream or vision.

Perhaps it was a dawning of understanding or even a growing in conviction.

Perhaps you heard through the words of someone else - a friend or parent's nudging, a preacher even!

Or maybe, like me, you have stood in a beautiful place, dwarfed by the magnificence of creation, and just known...

As we have heard this morning, there are lots of different ways God calls to us.

Heaven knows we sometimes need to hear and experience something several times before it sinks in!

Isaiah has this amazing vision.

Peter, James and John are just out working at their everyday trade when God breaks into their not so good day and turns them around. They had caught nothing all night, they were packing up and preparing to go home empty handed, when Jesus shows up and starts teaching and then invites them to put the boats out again. Really?! We are all tired, we are all just a bit flat from our failure, and you want us to go out again - but this time to a different spot, to deeper water, where is it more dangerous and harder to catch anything. And here, there, they find more fish that they know what to do with!

What there is no doubt about is that God calls, beckons, invites, nudges - and sometimes, like the big catch of fish, jumps up and down in front of us until we notice!!

More than that, God doesn't call us once and then never shows up again.

God continues to call, to beckon, to invite, to nudge us.

And there is always the possibility that, while we think we are doing what God has called us to do, God may want us to understand that it is time to mix things up again, time to take a different course, time to try another spot in the lake.

We do sometimes get comfortable. We are creatures of routine - and we hold on to routines, particularly here in the Church, far longer than is helpful.

I wonder... the disciples were having a bad day, they had got to a point where they were simply not catching any fish. And they had returned to the shore tired and probably hungry. As a church, can we identify with that? The people coming seems to be dwindling and we are tired.

What happens? Jesus enters the scene, first he teaches - he spends some time reminding them all of what God had created them to be, what God had intended for the world.

And then he sends them back out onto the lake - but to a different part - a deeper, less familiar part. And it is there they find abundance.

Perhaps it is time for us all to spend some intentional time being reminded of the teachings of Jesus and immersing ourselves in the Scriptures. And I am convinced that when we do,

God's Spirit will nudge us into the deeper water where it might be hard work, but the catch, the harvest, will be abundant.

One thing I know is that God can be both patient and persistent!

And even when we are actively trying to figure out what God is pointing us to, it sometimes takes us a while to figure it out. Which is why consistent prayer and seeking is so important to our growth as disciples or followers of Jesus. We need to stop often, to pray, to check in, and to be open to a nudge in another direction.

Sometimes God's call is to an individual - like Isaiah.

Sometimes it is to a group - like the disciples. I wonder whether all the fisherfolk that day went with Jesus or just a few? What would it feel like to be left holding the nets, so to speak?

Always God calls to us for the benefit of more than ourselves: Isaiah is sent to call the people of Israel back to God's way; the disciples are invited to come and learn of the ways of God in Jesus and then sent into all the world to share what they have discovered.

In both these stories there is a recognition that God's call can seem to be beyond our human capacity or worthiness. Isaiah says he has "unclean lips" and Peter declares himself to be a "sinful man".

And yet...

And yet - God persists and tells them to get up and get on with it.

No-one here is unworthy of God's love or God's sending - no-one!

Which means each one of us can hear or discern the prompting of God's Spirit - and we need to be open to how God might even sometimes surprise or amaze us.

There are so many ways we can read these stories of Isaiah and the first disciples - so many questions we can ask of the stories and ask of ourselves. I want to leave just some of my questions with you to ponder, pray and share with one another:

- How do we stay alert to how and when God might want to redirect us?
- How do we hold ourselves accountable to each other when discerning God's call as an individual or as a group?
- How can we address the self-doubt we often experience when we embark on something new?
- How can we affirm and encourage each other to follow where God is leading, even when that seems surprising or out of the "ordinary"?

Creator God, you have drawn us from deep within ourselves into your loving net of grace. Strengthen us to cast such a net of justice and mercy into the depths of this community and world, that all might feel enfolded by your realm. Amen.
