Assurance

As we heard from Jeremiah:

- ⁷ Blessed are those who trust in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord.
- ⁸ They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream.
- It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green;
- in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit.

God hears our prayer and as we trust, we sink our roots deep into the river of life, nourished and strengthen to produce fruit in good times and in tough time. So wriggle your toes and bury them deep in God's love.

Sing - The Deeper River (AOV 2-6)

This is likely not a familiar song so feel free to simply listen and contemplate the words. It is a bit of an extension of the imagery we have heard in the readings from Psalm 1 and Jeremiah - the idea of sinking our roots deep into the living water Jesus offers to us.

There's a river running deep within the silence of our souls where the quenching, healing waters carve their art. At its source a spring of living water surging and sustained; it's the voice of Jesus waiting for the listening of our hearts.

When the living waters flow in us, when the living waters flow again, they will carry us they will wash us down they will quench our thirst again. At times the river of our life winds wandering away. Sometimes the rapids tumble restlessly. Comes the time to stop and find the deeper river running strong, to drink refreshing waters and to hear the Spirit's song. *When the living waters...*

Hear the the call to thirsty people, there's no need to thirst again. To the weary, come beside still waters lie. Full of goodness, full of mercy, our cup will overflow, when the call of that deep river is a voice we've come to know. *When the living waters...*

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Listening for God's Voice

Reading: Luke 6:17-26 (Marion Rattray)

¹⁷ [Jesus] came down with them and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon. ¹⁸They had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases; and those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. ¹⁹And all in the crowd were trying to touch him, for power came out from him and healed all of them.

²⁰ Then he looked up at his disciples and said:

'Blessed are you who are poor,

for yours is the kingdom of God.

²¹ 'Blessed are you who are hungry now,

for you will be filled.

'Blessed are you who weep now,

for you will laugh.

²² 'Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. ²³Rejoice on that day and leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets.

Reflection

Spirit of Life, move amongst us now,

and open our hearts and minds to the wonder of God's way for us and all of creation. Give us courage to challenge ourselves to be always reaching for a way of life that reflects who God calls us to be. In Christ's name, we pray. Amen.

We pick up Jesus' story this week in the middle of Luke 6 with an account of Jesus' teaching that parallels Matthew 5 and what we call the Sermon on the Mount. Luke's version is more like the "Sermon on the plain".

Jesus has called his disciples - including Peter, James and John, and also Levi, the tax collector. And he has been teaching and healing.

He has already upset the Pharisees on a range of levels - not the least for his perceived breaches of the laws of Sabbath - he had healed someone and he had allowed his disciples to pick corn to eat.

Now he moves to a "level place" - he comes down from the mountain where he has been praying and meets the crowd ("a great multitude" from all over the region (6:17)) where it is level.

His teaching, according to Luke, is direct - not spiritualised as in Matthew's version - rather, it is much more concrete. And it is clearly constructed as dualistic reversals. The blessings and the woes - the encouragement and the warning.

This is what God's kingdom, God's way is like:

Blessed are you who are poor for you belong in God's kingdom. (6:20) Woe to you who are rich, for you have already had your reward. (6:24)

Blessed are you who are hungry for you will have your fill. (6:21) Woe to you who are full now for you will come to know hunger. (6:25)

Blessed are you who are weeping now for you will get to laugh. (6:21) Woe to you who laugh now for you will mourn and weep. (6:25)

Blessed are you when you are hated and defamed on account of your trust in Jesus, leap for joy for your reward is great in God's kingdom. (6:22) Woe to you who haven't offended anyone because you are like the false prophets (6:26).

Each one, reverses the expectations about the world they knew - echoing the song Mary sung about Jesus in Luke 1 - and echoing through the ages to us, today - challenged still by words that reverse our expectations about how the world works.

For us, money talks, money is power, and our society is structured in a way that allows "the market", the power of money, to determine what we eat, what we where, where we live, what jobs we can take - almost every aspect of our practical living. But there is a problem with that - the very people for whom God is concerned, the poor, the hungry, can't participate in "the market" - if you have no money, you can't choose where to spend it! And our democracy is not help - look what happens when a candidate or party runs on a platform that will spend money on the poor - no-one wants to know, especially since we all know that the money has to come from somewhere and mostly we don't want it to come from us... Harsh? Perhaps - but I don't think that is an entirely unfair assessment of our political system.

But the world <u>God</u> intends, has created us for, is one where the poor are taken care of, the hungry are fed, the grieving are comforted, and where people who are now condemned for their faith in God's way will find reward and satisfaction.

More than that, the people who think they are comfortable and well-off and and who ignore the plight of the poor and hungry, they will find themselves desperately uncomfortable.

And it is about now that most of us here begin to squirm a bit - or we ought to...

There is no doubt that most of us here today are relatively well-off, rarely hungry and mostly well thought of in our community. Perhaps the part we identify with most closely is the one about weeping as I think most of us know what it is to weep - for someone we have lost, for relationships that have broken, sometimes even for the world that is not as we hope it might be and the powerlessness that we feel in all that.

But what do we do with the rest?

Right now, as a church, we are thinking about who God calls us to be and how we can be about God's mission oil the world? Part of this is about how we use the buildings that are entrusted to us?

So what happens to our conversations if we said we would take seriously God's call to ensure the poor are cared for, and that people who are hungry are fed?

What does it look like for us to challenge the ways our community values money and measures success?

Perhaps we need to be more outspoken, even offensive, when it comes to issues of poverty, hunger, homelessness and the privilege given to some but not all? The thing is, in order to do that, our actions have to match our words - so if we want to call our community, our government, even our friends and family, to account for ignoring the plight of the most vulnerable in our community, then we have to be willing to match our words with our own actions - so - how can we offer support and care to people who are vulnerable in our community?

And, as Jesus managed to offend both his own people, the Jewish authorities, as well as the wider community, so we may need to offend each other from time to time in order to call each other to focus again God's way, on the order of the world, the kingdom, God calls us into.

Let me give an example. Do you know why I don't think we, the Christian church, should be supporting the Religious Discrimination Bill? It is not only because of the way it treats gay and transgender people as an exception - although that, in itself, is heinous - it is because the Bill seeks to protect the already powerful in ways that seem to me to be unthinkable to Jesus as he teaches on the plain (in Luke 6). Neither the Christian church, nor any other faith group, needs protection to show the expansive, radical, inclusive love of God - that is not Jesus' way. Jesus acknowledges that sometimes showing love will upset people, generally those who enjoy privilege and power.

Paul writes in Galatians 5:23 - "the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things."

This teaching of Jesus here (Luke 6), speaks directly to those who would want to protect themselves and/or their own patch. That is not what God's kingdom is about - God's kingdom is for everyone, and most of all, for those whom the rest of the world has forgotten, overlooked, or deliberately tried to trample.

Here at this table, we catch a glimpse of the wonder that is God's embrace. All of us, each one, has a place here, belongs here, is loved, valued and honoured. Poor and rich, hungry and full, weeping and content, defamed and thought well of - each one and all of us, gathered seeking God's way of love and grace. And each time, someone comes into this circle, no matter what, space is made, we all shuffle over a bit to ensure there is room. As we share here this morning, may we live into the glimpse of heaven we share in - may we be forming a community where the expectations of the world are turned on their head in order to ensure that all are loved and the most vulnerable amongst us are nurtured, nourished and valued.

Let us pray,

Gracious God, blessed or warned, sometimes we are not sure which we are.

Perhaps, living Lord, we are both.

Blessed or warned, gather us all in your love and grace.

And prompt us to be alert to your warning as we share in your blessings.

In Christ's name, we pray. Amen.

Responding

Prayer for Others (Michele Broad) Wise and generous God, we take time today to do as the old hymn suggests, and 'count our blessings', naming them silently, one by one, and giving thanks to you, the source of all that is good, and of the deep-down happiness for which we long.

We give thanks for the obvious blessings, never to be taken for granted:

for good health when we have it,

and access to medical care;

for food in our bellies and a safe place to live; for people who care about us and for whom we can care;

for freedom to dress and speak and worship as we choose, without fear of persecution.

But we are grateful also for the curious blessings recognised as such only with hindsight: for losses that help us see what really matters;

for vulnerability that enables us to reach out in love;

for our weakness that forces us to depend on you;

for brushes with death that have helped us value life more.

Loving God, you want all your children to live lives that are full and worthwhile, and we pray for those for whom each day is a struggle to survive, never mind thrive; for those who are trapped in poverty and cannot see that ever changing; those who so not have enough to eat, and those who overeat to bury their unhappiness; those who are shamed and humiliated for being who they are, and those who do the shaming.

God of justice and mercy, there is so much that is wrong with our world, which is also your world. We long for the coming of the Kingdom that Jesus talked about so much, and by whose standards he lived his life on earth: giving in order to receive; letting go in order to find; dying in order to live. Not lightly, but as honestly as we can, we pray for that Kingdom to come, knowing that if our prayer were to be answered, it might cost us dearly. Grant us your blessing, we pray, and enjoy the chaotic turmoil that ensues as we discover exactly what that means. Amen.
