Create a space for worship - perhaps with a small table with a bible, cross and candle.


This week, it would be appropriate to find a **white cloth** or scarf to signify that today is a special celebration. Take some deep breaths as you gather your thoughts towards God.

Introduction

Today is one of the pivot points in the church year. Today we celebrate the Transfiguration.

In the shadow of war in Ukraine, the gospel reading this morning takes us up a mountain as Jesus prepares his disciples for what lies ahead as they begin their journey towards Jerusalem where Jesus will collide head-on with the Jewish and Roman authorities.

On Wednesday, we start our own preparations for Easter. It is called Ash Wednesday and we will gather at Kiama to worship. Then next Sunday, Lent begins with Jesus in the wilderness.



Since early January, the time after Christmas is known as Epiphany - God's revealing. We have thought about how God is revealed in extravagant love and grace, in good news, in agitating for justice, in community, in turning the expectations of the world on its head, in relationship. Today we think about how God is revealed, how we recognise God, in the sacred moments of our lives.

Light Candle

We light a candle to centre us and to draw us towards Christ. The writer of the gospel attributed to John assures us:

Jesus spoke to them, saying,

"I am the light of the world.

Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life."

John 8:12

Reading: Luke 9:28-43a

²⁸ Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. ²⁹And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. ³⁰Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. ³¹They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. ³²Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. ³³Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah'—not knowing what he said. ³⁴While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. ³⁵Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' ³⁶When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

³⁷ On the next day, when they had come down from the mountain, a great crowd met him. ³⁸Just then a man from the crowd shouted, 'Teacher, I beg you to look at my son; he is my only child. ³⁹Suddenly a spirit seizes him, and all at once he shrieks. It throws him into convulsions until he foams at the mouth; it mauls him and will scarcely leave him. ⁴⁰I begged your disciples to cast it out, but they could not.' ⁴¹Jesus answered, 'You faithless and perverse generation, how much longer must I be with you and bear with you? Bring your son here.' ⁴²While he was coming, the demon dashed him to the ground in convulsions. But Jesus rebuked the unclean spirit, healed the boy, and gave him back to his father. ⁴³And all were astounded at the greatness of God.

I am not sure what. So yep, not going to say a word. What just happened?

Assurance

Listening for God's Voice

Reading: 2 Corinthians 3:12-4:2

¹² Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, ¹³not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside. ¹⁴But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. ¹⁵Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; ¹⁶but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. ¹⁷Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. ¹⁸And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit.

Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. ²We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practise cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God.

For the Word of God in Scripture, for the Word of God among us, for the Word of God within us, *Thanks be to God!*

Reflection

Let us pray...

God of all Creation, as your light shines and transforms how the disciples understood who Jesus is, so we look for ways your light reveals the wonder and mystery of your love, your way, in the world today. Help us to be open to your prompting and revealing, in our lives, we pray. Amen.

As I mentioned earlier, today is a pivot point in the church year.

The story of the Transfiguration of Jesus is one we return to every year - held in importance alongside Jesus' birth, baptism, death and resurrection, and the story of the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

Like so many of the stories of Jesus, each of the [synoptic] gospel writers (Matthew, Mark and Luke) record the event in a way that is imbued with symbol and sign and connections to other parts of God's relationship with the Hebrew people.

Jesus' clothes turned white and bright - Mark adds that they are "dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them" (Mark 9:3)!

Two of the great prophets of Israel appear - Moses and Elijah (Luke 9:30)

A cloud envelops them, from which a voice speaks (Luke 34-36).

The story parallels the experience of Moses on Mt Sinai when he went to speak with God and returned to his people with his face glowing (Exodus 24-34); and the experience of Elijah when he is taken up in the clouds at the end of his ministry (2 Kings 2).

Jesus, here, is embraced by God and affirmed: "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" (Luke 9:35).

All of the gospel writers place this story at the point where Jesus begins speaking of his death and the way of the cross and begins the journey towards Jerusalem.

It's kind of like God saying - can I make it any clearer? This person, this Jesus, my Son, is showing you the path that has been shown to you for generations - since the time of Moses and the prophets - what he is showing you is the way I have intended since the world began!

So what is this way that Jesus shows us?

First, it is all about love - love that it is without limit or restriction, love that reaches every part of God's good creation.

And this love heals body, mind and heart.

This love seeks justice for people and lands that are oppressed.

This love longs for, prays for, and works for reconciled relationships and peace - between individuals, groups and nations.

This love challenges bullies and people who misuse their power - and remains engaged regardless of the cost, perhaps even at the cost of reputation and life itself.

This love knows that death is never the end - that new life and endless love can never be defeated.

And Paul, in the reading we just heard from 2 Corinthians reminds us that we, Jesus' followers today, are not just called into a life and ministry that reflects the way of Jesus but we are being *transformed into* the image of Jesus, a reflection of Jesus (2 Cor 3:18). Our vision, then, does not need to be shrouded or veiled, because we have a clear picture of who Jesus is and who he calls us to be.

So Paul puts it like this:

We do not lose heart. ²We have renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practise cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God. (2 Corinthians 4:1-2)

Today, we gather in the midst of a war on the other side of the world (the reminders of previous wars hang on the walls), and the reality of an ongoing pandemic and the struggle to maintain employment and a roof over our heads.

It is in the midst of all of this, perhaps more than ever, that we join with Peter and James and John, wondering what we should do?

For generations, souls have come into this space, gathered around this table, for refreshment and renewal.

They have come to worship the God of Creation, the Christ of boundless love, the Spirit who breathes life and freedom to all.

To this place, they have brought their beloved to be blessed;

their children to be baptised;

and, in time, their friends have brought them to sing them home on their final journey into everlasting Love.

Here, together, we gaze once more on the figure of Jesus, with face and clothes shining, and God's voice encouraging us to keep our eyes fixed on him, to open our ears to his teaching and to imitate his life in our own living.

Here, together, we will be reminded of Jesus' invitation to keep meeting together, to share bread and wine together, to remember him, to remember his way of living in the world. Here, together, as we share in bread and wine, we resolve once more to commit ourselves to the the way of love in the world, to the way of peace and justice and reconciliation with our God, with our neighbours, with all of Creation.

Responding

Prayer for Others

We are going to sing our prayer for others today... As you sing (or speak) the words of this beautiful hymn, we think about the particular people, places and circumstances that are on our hearts - particularly we pray for peace across the world, for people in Ukraine caught up in violence, we pray for those left homeless or dispossessed of their land, separated from their families - in those places of war and turmoil, and here in our own town - we pray...

Sing - Christ Be Our Light (All Together OK 313)

Longing for light, we wait in darkness. Longing for truth, we turn to you. Make us your own, your holy people, light for the world to see.

Christ, be our light! Shine in our hearts. Shine through the darkness. Christ, be our light! Shine in your church gathered today.

Longing for peace, our world is troubled. Longing for hope, many despair. Your word alone has power to save us. Make us your living voice. *Christ, be our light...* Longing for food, many are hungry. Longing for water, many still thirst. Make us your bread, broken for others, shared until all are fed. *Christ, be our light...*

Longing for shelter, many are homeless. Longing for warmth, many are cold. Make us your building, sheltering others walls made of living stone. *Christ, be our light...*

Many the gifts, many the people, many the hearts that yearn to belong. Let us be servants to one another, making your kingdom come. *Christ, be our light...*
