Call to Worship

Sing - God of Day and God of Darkness (AOV1-56)

- 1. God of day and God of darkness, now we stand before the night; as the shadows stretch and deepen, come and make our darkness bright. All creation still is groaning for the dawning of your might, when the Sun of peace and justice fills the earth with radiant light.
- 2. Still the nations curse the darkness, still the rich oppress the poor; still the earth is bruised and broken by the ones who still want more. Come and wake us from our sleeping, so our hearts cannot ignore, all your people lost and broken, all your children at our door.
- 3. Show us Christ in one another, make us servants strong and true; give us all your love of justice, so we do what you would do. Let us call all people holy, let us pledge our lives anew, make us one with all the lowly, let us all be one in you.
- 4. You shall be the path that guides us, you the light that in us burns; shining deep within all people, yours the love that we must learn, for our hearts shall wander restless 'til they safe to you return; finding you in one another, we shall all your face discern.

5. Gentle Father, Loving Mother, Jesus: Brother, Saviour, Friend; Spirit of all grace and power, may we praise you without end. Grant us all a peaceful resting, let each mind and body mend, so we rise refreshed tomorrow, hearts renewed to kingdom tend.

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Introduction to Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the 40 days of Lent - well, 40 days plus Sundays. From the of earliest times, the church used this time as a time of preparation - for preparing disciples who would be baptised on Easter Day, for preparing disciples who may have gone astray and perhaps had even been excommunicated - thankfully we don't do that any more! From the earliest of times, it was considered a time for prayer and fasting - echoing the time Jesus spent in the wilderness before he began his public ministry (more about that on Sunday).

The readings tonight speak to us about what fasting and prayer look like - what are we trying to achieve? what does God really want from us?

Reading: Isaiah 58:1-12

Shout out, do not hold back!
Lift up your voice like a trumpet!
Announce to my people their rebellion,
to the house of Jacob their sins.

Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways,

as if they were a nation that practised righteousness and did not forsake the ordinance of their God;

they ask of me righteous judgements,

they delight to draw near to God.

Why do we fast, but you do not see? Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?'

Look, you serve your own interest on your fast-day,

and oppress all your workers.

⁴ Look, you fast only to quarrel and to fight and to strike with a wicked fist.

Such fasting as you do today

will not make your voice heard on high.

- ⁵ Is such the fast that I choose,
 - a day to humble oneself?

Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush, and to lie in sackcloth and ashes?

Will you call this a fast,

a day acceptable to the Lord?

6 Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?

7 Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin?

8 Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the Lord shall be your rearguard.

9 Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am.

If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil, ¹⁰ if you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday. 11 The Lord will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water. whose waters never fail. 12 Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in.

Prayer - Confession

Invite people to hold their palm crosses Ever-faithful God,

we hear the words of the prophet Isaiah and we wonder...

- is our discipleship more of a show than a wholehearted commitment to your way?
- do we take workers for granted?
- are we part of a system that allows people to be paid less than their efforts deserve, or less than is enough to feed and home their families?
- do we quarrel or fight or resort to violence we don't get our own way?
- are we doing all we can to ensure that each one of your precious children is fed, housed, clothed, and given every opportunity that our own children have had?
- do we speak up for justice?

God, these crosses have witnessed our praying and our reading and our living throughout this past year. Some days we feel like we have done OK, and other days we know we have not got it right. Here and now, we offer it all to you - the good parts and the parts we would now rather forget.

Forgive us.

As we offer these crosses, may we know that we are loved, forgiven and free to return to you and to try again...

Response - bring palm crosses

Throughout the year, we have prayed with these crosses; we have held them or carried them as we have gone about our lives this past year. It is time to let go of what has been.

As we sing, we place our palm crosses in the bowl.

Sing - Create In Me A Clean Heart (P&W434) Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. (repeat)

Cast me not away from your presence, O God, and take not your Holy Spirit from me.
Restore unto me the joy of your salvation, and renew a right spirit within me.

[Light the crosses and let them burn]

Assurance

The prophet Joel again:

12 Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning;
13 rend your hearts and not your clothing.
Return to the Lord, your God, for [God] is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing.

As the crosses turn to ashes, we leave behind what is past, and we turn again to the God who waits for us, the God who embraces us, the God who loves us into being all that we were created to be.

Listening for God's Voice

Reading: Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21

'Beware of practising your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven.

- 2 'So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ³But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, ⁴so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.
- ⁵ 'And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell

you, they have received their reward. ⁶But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

- ¹⁶ 'And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ¹⁷But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, ¹⁸so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.
- ¹⁹ 'Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; ²⁰but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

Reflection

Ash Wednesday - already?!

It creeps up on us with a degree of stealth...

Perhaps that's because our attention has well and truly been elsewhere these past weeks - as it rightly should be.

Between watching, waiting, worrying and praying about the unfolding situation in Ukraine and the flooding in Queensland and northern NSW, and now the developing rain here - well, it is no wonder that our minds and hearts have been fully occupied.

The question Ash Wednesday poses for us is - do we have the focus right?

How do we pray when a world leader seems to have gone on a power-hungry rampage? How do we pray when we see the impact of that power on everyday people in the Ukraine, like you and me who are just going about their lives?

How do we pray when the waters coming down the river are more than we have ever seen before and people are forced to flee from the rooftops?

How do we pray as it keeps on raining? We joke about Noah, but goodness!

How do we pray when we are helpless in the face of human abuse of power and the power of nature?

Ash Wednesday holds the reality of ash - that sometimes it feels like everything has been lost, completely destroyed.

But it also holds before us the promise, the hope, that from the ashes, new life will emerge. And that mostly, that emerging of new life takes time, it takes nurturing, it takes a commitment to doing things a bit differently - these are all themes we explore over the next few weeks.

So the readings today invite us to take stock - of the way we are living, of how we are living out our discipleship in the world.

Perhaps a question to ask ourselves is how does the world see the life of Jesus in me? How does the world see God's love in me?

And if there are changes to make - maybe it <u>is</u> giving up a bad habit, but more often it is likely to be nurturing a <u>new</u> habit of prayer, of fasting, perhaps, or perhaps it is about

nurturing an intentional focus on the way of Jesus and how we live that out in a world that knows too well the reality of ash.

Whatever it is for you, may we be people who not only acknowledge the reality of ash and dust, but the hope that is in God's promise to bring new life out of the dust and ashes.
