Throughout this time we are reconnecting with what it looks for us to be 21st Century followers of Jesus.

Last week we were thinking about how we engage with the Scriptures.

Today we are thinking about how 21st Century disciples take the long view.

In a world of instant news, instant access to almost anything we desire, what does it mean to commit to something, to the way of Jesus, for the long haul...?

## **Call to Worship**

Psalm 27 says this:

- <sup>13</sup> I believe that I shall see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living.
- Wait for the Lord; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the Lord!

#### **Prayer - Confession**

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### **Listening for God's Voice**

**Reading:** Luke 13:31-35

<sup>31</sup> At that very hour some Pharisees came and said to him, 'Get away from here, for Herod wants to kill you.' <sup>32</sup>He said to them, 'Go and tell that fox for me, "Listen, I am casting out demons and performing cures today and tomorrow, and on the third day I finish my work. <sup>33</sup>Yet today, tomorrow, and the next day I must be on my way, because it is impossible for a prophet to be killed away from Jerusalem." <sup>34</sup>Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing! <sup>35</sup>See, your house is left to you. And I tell you, you will not see me until the time comes when you say, "Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord."

#### Reflection

Gathering God, we wait patiently, longing to see your goodness in our world.

Lift our eyes to see, widen our vision and open our hearts to embrace the wonder that you have created.

Give us courage to face the brokenness.

And remind us again of the hope you offer to us and to all the world. Amen.

The readings in the lead-up to Easter invite us to consider carefully and deeply our commitment to following Jesus.

Last week, we encountered Jesus in the wilderness, being tempted or tested - how will he use Scripture? How will he use the power and authority he has been given? Are we prepared to follow him into the wilderness?

How is not only our knowledge of the Scriptures but our understanding and ability to draw from its wisdom to enable us in today's world?

Today, we leap towards the other end of Jesus' travels towards Jerusalem. He is not far from the city when he is warned to clear off because Herod, has it in for him. Jesus' response places himself squarely in the political, religious and social milieu of the time. He doesn't run away from the threat but confronts it, not in a fist-shaking kind of way but in speaking truth to power, lamenting the present reality and committing to the continuing work of teaching, healing and reminding people of God's intentions for them.

Now there is a good deal of symbol and sign in Jesus' language here which I am happy to go into on another occasion - today I want us to look at this through the question - what is it revealing to us about how we are called to follow Jesus today?

Taking the long view...

Jesus is not afraid to name the duplicity of Herod - "that fox", Jesus calls him. He is also able to grieve for what is broken - the state of the city of Jerusalem - intended to be a "light to the nations", called by the prophets time and again to return to God's way, and yet hostile and resistance to God's purpose.

And in the midst of the political manoeuvrings, the Roman oppression, the religious ignorance, Jesus keeps at his task of healing, giving hope to people caught in the midst of circumstances not entirely of their own making, teaching a way of living that confronts power and politics and injustice with love, grace and mercy.

Taking the long view - trusting the impossibility of God's way of love.

Taking the long view - working, long-term, committing, long-term, to working for justice, peace, reconciliation, a world that better reflects God's intention for us all - and not giving up when solutions aren't easy or change seems to be more like "one step forward and tw steps back".

In a world that wants instant solutions, expects easy answers, gives up or loses interest when things get a bit complex, Jesus' followers are in for the long haul.

I have an Uncle in England who is a retired policeman - Derbyshire Police. He refuses to watch police dramas on television - particularly the ones that insist on the case being resolved within the space of one episode...

As with police dramas, life's problems are rarely resolved in the space of an hour, or even a day, and sometimes they take years.

Jesus' disciples commit to the long-term.

Even when a resolution or reconciliation seems well beyond our grasp.

The Scriptures are full of stories of God doing amazing things - and often taking years - again we get caught in the simplicity of a few page turns, but more often than not, there are years, if not decades in between. For example, in the Old Testament reading (which we haven't read, Genesis 15, God promises Abram and Sarai descendants that will number more than the stars in the sky! They are both already old, remember they were in their 70s when they followed God's call to a new land, and yet they will wait even longer before God begins to fulfil that promise.

The Psalmist in Psalm 27 speaks of experiences that have challenged him and of the hope in God that sustains him. This is a psalm that speaks across stretches of lived experience - both joyful and challenging. It begins with a statement of faith:

<sup>1</sup> The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear?
The Lord is the stronghold of my life;

of whom shall I be afraid?

It traverses the experiences of life and death.

And ends with a statement of hope and commitment:

- <sup>13</sup> I believe that I shall see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living.
- Wait for the Lord; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the Lord!

The followers of Jesus hold all of this.

As the song we heard says, "work in the darkness, trust in the light".

But us humans, well, we are not always good at remembering God's promises, God's love, God's call to us. When life gets hard, we are often quick to forget.

Which is why it is important that Jesus's followers meet together often - to remind one another, to encourage one another.

In Abram's time, God gave Abram an amazing vision to remind him.

To us, Jesus gave us this meal - so that as we share together, we would remember him, remember his life, remember what it cost, remember his risen life, and catch a glimpse of what we can be when we share together without discrimination or favouritism or privilege getting in the way.

Whether life is going well or is more of a struggle, this table reminds us of the goodness of God, it grounds us and holds us, and invites us to "Wait for the Lord; be strong, and let your heart take courage" (Psalm 27:14).

That's not to say we "wait" with our feet up and a cup of tea!

Rather, our waiting is active - as Jesus says in Luke 13 - keeping on with the ministry of healing, loving, attending to people around us, working for peace and justice in the communities we are a part of, making space for the in-breaking of God's love and life in the world.

Jesus' followers take the long view.

Covenant God, may we trust in you when the evidence says don't. May we follow you when the world says not to. May we live with the impossible when everything else says we can't. May we hear the promise in our souls, and live it in our world. Amen.

because there is just too much suffering in the world;

too many problems that cannot be solved;

too many people beyond our reach to help.

## Loving God,

may your compassion break through all our defences.

May we be willing to take just one more risk for love's sake,

and in the eternal battle between goodness and evil, love and hatred, life and death,

may we discover, with Christ and all his faithful servants,

that goodness and love and life

are always stronger

and will win out in the end.
