Nathan Tyson, Synod of NSW/ACT Manager for First Peoples Strategy and Engagement attended the recent Illawarra Presbytery meeting.

Nathan shared ways congregations can engage with Aboriginal Communities and supplied resources to assist with this.

Nathan is an Aboriginal man of Anaiwon/Gomeroi descent (with connections to the Brown, Munro and Sullivan families from the Tingha region in North Western NSW). He has spent most of his life in Sydney.

Acknowledgment of Country

An Acknowledgement of First Peoples is a way of paying respect to First Peoples whenever we gather together.

The Uniting Church in Australia's national council, the Assembly encourages congregations, schools, agencies and governing bodies to ensure a Welcome by, or an Acknowledgement of, First Peoples is given at the commencement of all gatherings and acts of worship.

Why do we encourage this respectful practice?

Acknowledgement is an important expression of:

- the covenant which the Uniting Church in Australia has with the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress (UAICC)
- the Preamble to our Uniting Church in Australia Constitution
- the affirmation by the 15th Assembly in 2018 of Aboriginal and Islander Australians as sovereign peoples in this land

What does it mean to Acknowledge Country?

- recognises the place of Indigenous people as the First Peoples of this land
- Promotes awareness of the history and culture of the First Peoples
- formally acknowledges First Peoples ongoing connection to land

From the AGM

Presbytery Minister - Mission

Presbytery had previously voted to create a second Presbytery Minister placement, Presbytery Minister Mission. This position was created to relieve the existing Presbytery Minister, Rev Grant Bilbey of much of his significant workload.



The position Presbytery Minister was to be replaced with Presbytery Minister - Mission and Presbytery Minister - Vital Ministry. Rev Grant was offered either position, choosing the role of Presbytery Minister - Vital Ministry.

A Joint Nominating Committee (JNC) was tasked with finding a suitable person to fill the role of Presbytery Minister - Mission.

Rev Dr Matthew Wilson was called to the position at the AGM. Rev Matt will conclude his placement at Nowra Uniting Church with a Closure of Ministry service on Sunday 10 April. Matt has been in placement at Nowra since December 2015.

After taking a well earned 5 week break Matt will take up his new role on 1 June.

Presbytery Strategic Mission Working Group

At the last Presbytery meeting (February), the Presbytery Strategic Mission Working Group presented two important items for the consideration of the Presbytery.

Illawarra Presbytery Mission Plan

The Presbytery has now approved the mission/operational plan, and the Committees and Working Groups of the Presbytery are working hard to develop their work plans to reflect the priorities set by the Presbytery. The agreed areas of focus for the Presbytery for the next 3-5 years are:

- 1. Build a healthy, growing presbytery
- 2. Support congregations, working collaboratively
- 3. Nurture and equip healthy ministers and lay leaders
- 4. Facilitate new, wider mission opportunities
- Adequately resource God's mission in congregations and communities

Exploring new ministry opportunities in West Lake

For a number of years, the Presbytery has been considering how we might invest in ministry and mission in the new development areas in West Lake, to the west of Albion Park and Dapto.

As the development has begun to take shape, it has become clearer that the new communities around Calderwood are very different from the communities planned further north. Presbytery has now agreed to separate our thinking about this region in order that we can explore working collaboratively with Albion Park UC in the Calderwood area to consider a regional approach; and also continuing conversations with a number of congregations to the north. Safe Church Awareness Training

If congregations are in need of face-to-face Safe Church Awareness Training, Presbytery Training and Education Working Group suggests inquiring into the Baptist Church *Creating Safe Spaces* course.

Creating Safe Spaces training is completed in two parts including an online module which can be completed at any time before attending a workshop at a cost of \$10 per person, and the workshop itself costing \$25 per person.

The online module can be done as a group with one person "driving" the online module on a large screen (or projector) while others watch on. The question portion of the online module can be filled in on paper by attendees and sent to the facilitator for accreditation.

The suggestion is to break up the online module into a couple of sessions, so people do not get too overwhelmed with information.

Workshops are three hours long and can be booked for Saturday mornings or afternoons, Sunday afternoons or weeknights.

A minimum charge for a workshop is \$500. A group of at least 20 people will cover this cost. Please contact Vi Richardson if you would like to run a workshop but do not have 20 people. There may be others in the Presbytery who could attend a workshop at your church.

Being Mindful of a Minister's Day Off

The mental health benefits of completely unplugging from work are well documented.

An uninterrupted day of relaxation is important for mental health and wellbeing.

The age of being contactable anytime to answer phone calls and emails has been made worse with COVID-19, as the formal boundaries that separate work from non-work become even more blurred.

If we feel constantly connected, we are not truly refreshing and recharging, ready to come back to work at full mental capacity and maximum motivation.

Congregations can be mindful of a minister's or agent's day off by announcing in church and in your newsletter: What is their day off.

Suggesting emails and phone calls are saved for other days.

Recommending people make specific appointment times, where possible, to see the minister on another day.

If it can be avoided, don't schedule activities, events or meetings for the minister's day off.

From time to time, it may be necessary for Ministers to change days off, either as a one-off event or for a longer term. Please be mindful of being flexible and supportive when such issues arise.

Ministers and ministry agents are 'giving' people. We need to ensure they have time to switch off.

Please email Vi Richardson Admin.ip@nswact.uca.au to let her know the minister's, ministry agent's or any other employee's day off, so Presbytery can also avoid contacting people when they are off duty.

Pastors Commissioned

On Sunday, 30 January Presbytery commissioned Gedeon Tito Rutabura and Justin Ndengeye Bugegeri as Pastors in Wollongong Mission UC

Mindful of COVID safety, the number of attendees who attended in person was limited to 100 and a further 20 people from around the world joined via *Zoom*. The service was led by Rev Geoff Flynn, senior Minister at Wollongong Mission and deputy chairperson of the Presbytery. He charged each pastor to be good shepherds of Christ's flock. While the congregation had to forego its usual energetic singing and dancing, the junior choir lifted the spirits of the congregation with songs of praise in English and Kirundi.

Gedeon and Justin approached Wollongong Mission in 2018 about the possibility of conducting a Wesleyan service of worship in their mother tongue for Banyamulenge families who, having fled persecution in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), were seeking to rebuild their lives. The congregation rapidly grew to incorporate new 10 families. Eager to learn about the ethos of the UCA, Gedeon and Justin completed the "Living our Values" and "Ethical Foundations in Ministry" and embraced the invitation to be commissioned as Pastors in the Afternoon service.

Prior to arriving in Australia with his family in 2018, Gedeon completed a Diploma in Law. and a Diploma in Biblical Studies in Bujumbura, Burundi. He served as Youth Pastor in the Free Methodist Church of the Congo in a circuit of five congregations and 2000 members in

Bujumbura.

Forced to flee his home in the DRC in 1998 to live in Uvira, Justin served as an Elder and Choir leader in Burundi. Moving to Kenya he was ordained as an Evangelist in the Breakthrough International Ministry He and his family arrived in Australia in 2014.

In his response during the service, Gedeon thanked God for enabling him to do God's will. Justin said, "I believe this is God's plan". Both thanked Rev Geoff Flynn for his mentorship.

Presbytery Strategic Property Task Group

Available to Assist Congregations make the most of Property Assets

Recognising that many congregations require increased funding to achieve their missional goals and to cover the cost of building maintenance and compliance, Illawarra Presbytery committees and working groups have been considering how best to assist congregations raise the necessary resources.

From these discussions, the Presbytery Finance and Property Committee (PF&PC) formed a task group - the Strategic Property Task Group (SPTG).

The purpose of the SPTG is to identify opportunities presented by property assets under the beneficial stewardship congregations, that may have the potential to generate income for the congregation to fund mission, ministry and function.

This process commences with an invitation from a church council for the review of the congregation's property assets.

The Pastoral Relations Committee, the Presbytery Strategic Mission Working Group and the SPTG then work together with the congregation to consider the congregation's mission plan and how property could best support the congregation's missional goals and assist in generating income.

If a congregation needs assistance to develop mission plans, the Presbytery Strategic Mission Working Group can support a congregation in conversations about mission and preparing missional plans. Such a plan would guide the SPTG in their review of the best use of congregational property.

The SPTG is able to offer the following skills as part of the review - Experience in evaluating options, consulting with local councils, negotiating with real estate agents, knowledge of when to call in the engineer, surveyors, architects. Expertise putting together business plans where required.

SPTG has already, or are in the process of, assisting some congregations in the Presbytery – Albion Park, Gerringong, Nowra, Wollongong Mission – Lifeline South Coast. SPTG has also through their research/review achieved a successful outcome for the Lloyd Rees Property of the Presbytery.

Australia Day Honours - Sharon Hoogland

Mrs Sharon Hoogland of Bowral-Mittagong Uniting Church was awarded on Australia Day 2022 an Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for service to the community, particularly through the church.

Current Bowral-Mittagong Uniting Church Secretary, Sharon has a long history of service to the Uniting Church including a 17-year contribution to the Bowral UC Church Council; six years as Illawarra Presbytery Administrator and volunteer Secretary; and member of National Assembly meetings in 2015 and 2018.

This award also recognised her service to Bowral UC offering gifts of music, preaching and Bible study leadership and to the food outreach program, to name a few.

"If we can find our purpose as we listen to God's call, and use the gifts and skills God's given us to work within the community or the church or wherever we are, then we're very blessed." You will learn how we make decisions together, and how effectively we communicate and nurture one another in our shared Christian discipleship.

Presbytery is endeavouring to offer the courses both electronically via *Zoom* and face-to-face, to suit the needs of everyone in our Presbytery.

Alternatively, Living Our Values can be run through church councils over a series of weeks.

Community Course - Mental Health First Aid (MHFA)

Learn how to provide mental health first aid to friends, family members, co-workers and other adults in your community.

UME are offering an MHFA course, from Mental Health First Aid Australia

The course teaches participants how to assist people who are developing a mental health problem, experiencing a worsening of an existing mental health problem or are in a mental health crisis, until appropriate professional help is received, or the crisis resolves.

The course is \$150 per person.

The course is made up of:

- A self-paced eLearning component (takes 5-7 hours to complete), and
- Two Zoom Sessions with UME's Joanna Drayton (2.5 hours each session).

Rather than a set date, people or congregations interested in doing the course should contact Vi Richardson who will arrange a start date when the minimum required number of 7 participants have expressed interest.

NOTE: This course is not a therapy or a support group, nor is it a professional counselling qualification, merely a First Aid Tool.

Plight of Refugees in Detention

Invitation to write to your local member

Invitation to write to your local member regarding the plight of refugees in detention

Congregations are invited to support the justice issue of Asylum Seekers by writing letters to their local members of parliament.

SBS recently screened a news story (<u>SBS News - Asylum Seekers</u>) about Religious leaders launching a campaign hoping to end indefinite detention. The report spoke about churches and other religious organisations in Australia coming together and appealing to the Prime Minister and the Leader of the Opposition for a change in policy.

During 2021, members of Keiraview UC met with Federal MP Sharon Bird and Senator Kristina Keneally about Australia's humanitarian intake of Asylum Seekers from Afghanistan. In the meeting, Senator Keneally strongly affirmed that writing letters about Social Justice issues was a powerful way for churches to advocate.

Keiraview's Social Justice and Evangelism Mission Action Team have sent a letter to a number of MP offices of both major parties and independent MPs.

If your congregation would like to send a similar letter, the Keiraview letter below is an example.

Your letter should be adapted and reworded, using different examples, so to not look like a form letter. This allows it to have more weight in the offices of the MPs of the Government and Opposition.

Hon Ms Karen Andrews MP Minister for Home Affairs

Dear Ms Andrews

The congregation of Keiraview Uniting Church wish to express our concern for Asylum seekers who arrived in Australia by boat after 2013 and have been held in detention ever since. There still remains thousands in both onshore and offshore detention, including those in hotel accommodation in Melbourne. The effect this has had on their mental and physical health has been tragic. Twelve people have died by suicide or due to inadequate health care (up to March 2021) and the emotional impact of their imprisonment is immeasurable.

Mehdi Ali, a refugee from Ahwaz, Iran and who has been in detention for nine years recently wrote "People here are not only in prison – they are in prison with no charge, no trial, no sentence. We are here indefinitely. We are here indefinitely, to be humiliated by a system designed to crush our values, dignity and self-esteem. The worst kind of torture, in my opinion, is the kind that destroys a person's character. This – our character – is something we have to hold onto hard."

Rev. Tim Costello has said "Compassion is the core of every faith," and as a faith community here at Keiraview Uniting Church we join with other faith groups in asking both Mr. Morrison as Prime Minister together with Mr. Albanese as Opposition Leader to agree to meet in order to reach a bipartisan agreement together on releasing refugees and asylum seekers held in indefinite detention into the Australian community.

We also request for an end to temporary protection visas for people who have been on these for many years and that these people be given permanent residency. Until this happens these people are not able to make a future for themselves.

We look forward to hearing your positive response.



Here's a bit about Steve, in his own words.


