Listening for God's Voice

Reading: Galatians 6:7-16

⁷ Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. ⁸If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. ⁹So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. ¹⁰So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith.

¹¹ See what large letters I make when I am writing in my own hand! ¹²It is those who want to make a good showing in the flesh that try to compel you to be circumcised—only that they may not be persecuted for the cross of Christ. ¹³Even the circumcised do not themselves obey the law, but they want you to be circumcised so that they may boast about your flesh. ¹⁴May I never boast of anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world. ¹⁵For neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is anything; but a new creation is everything! ¹⁶As for those who will follow this rule—peace be upon them, and mercy, and upon the Israel of God.

Reading: Luke 10:1-11, 16-20

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. ²He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out

labourers into his harvest. ³Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. ⁴Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. ⁵Whatever house you enter, first say, "Peace to this house!" ⁶And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. ⁷Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. ⁸Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; ⁹cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you." ¹⁰But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, ¹¹"Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near." ¹²I tell you, on that day it will be more tolerable for Sodom than for that town.

Reflection

Faithful God, open our hearts and minds to notice the prompting of your Spirit. Give us courage to align our lives with your way for all Creation. And open our mouths to proclaim the wonders of your way here in our midst. Amen.

This week, the Australian Bureau of Statistics released the first bundle of data from last year's census. The media seized on the numbers telling us that, for the first time in our history, the number of people who call themselves Christian in Australia has fallen below 50% (43.9%).

And the number of people who identified as "no religion" rose to 38.9% (up from 30.1% in 2016).¹

What worries me is that I have already heard the cry go up from some parts of the church, "O woe is us"! Even more troubling are the voices who say they can now claim "minority status" and who will seek to use these numbers to strengthen their arm in demands for protection again discrimination.

I am not going to go into the statistical analysis here - whilst I love that stuff - my brief attempt to navigate the ABS website, to access the tables led me down enough of a rabbit hole for me to find myself lost in the ABS website and none-the-wiser - an adventure for another day, perhaps.

And I am sure that over the coming weeks and months, there will be many who give an opinion as to the meaning of these new numbers. It is enough here to say that recent research also suggests that the "no religion" group is not closed to conversations about faith, and many of that group describe themselves as "spiritual" and open to the conversation about who God is.

So before we join in the chorus of woe, I want us to stop and breathe and take some time to consider...

And before we get buried or swept up in the numbers, maybe it is a good time to hear again of Jesus sending the 70 (or 72) into the world to proclaim God's kingdom. First the number - 70 or 72 - the various ancient texts are split almost 50/50 on that. Perhaps 70 or 72 is a symbolic number.

But let me ask this, whatever the number, it was either a large team, or a drop in the ocean compared to the number of villages and towns they needed to visit - depends on how you look at it, doesn't it?

Perhaps we could ask ourselves, what might happen if we split into pairs and went intentionally into the streets of our town and told whoever we met - what? What would we say?

The easy answer is, "we would tell them about Jesus!"

But that is not what Jesus sent his friends to do - look carefully and they are told to: - offer peace (10:5)

- share meals with those who welcome you (10:8)

- and then to cure the sick - now it seems to be getting a bit harder - and to say, "The kingdom of God has come near to you" (10:9)

They were not establishing rules or doctrines, but proclaiming, through their words and actions, a way of being in the world; a way of being in the world that even then was radically counter-cultural. Because this way of being (this kingdom) was not about power and control - but about peace and healing.

It didn't depend on money or strength - it came into the midst of what is, vulnerable and fragile, seeking out places of hospitality.

It doesn't come into being through some magical act or superpower, but through the commitment of each member of the community to live and relate to one another in ways that are healing and live-giving.

One commentator puts it like this:

By going on a road less travelled, one where we travel into the world with vulnerability and fragility, armed with only a message, is always going to be the harder way. But this tells us that it is the message itself that must speak. It is the ability to liberate and bring life that needs to speak, not a show of power. And that is harder, there is more invested in that message. In fact, everything of ourselves must be invested in that message.²

But we don't need to do it all alone. Jesus sends out his disciples in twos - to support each other. To do that, they need to learn to trust each other. And they need to learn that the good news of God's way for the world is not heard by force but by persuasion founded on relationships of mutual trust and care.

Who is your partner in ministry?

If you don't have a partner or small group that you can trust, how can we help you build a group together?

Apart from teaching us to live simply, travel lightly and to share peace and healing, this story also reminds us that Christian faith is not about the abilities of any one individual - but about a community that has been built to support each other; that does not need to wield power but simply has a message to share - a message that is shared both in words, and in the way it is embodied in our living - and that's what God's way, God's kingdom, is all about.

In his letter letter to the church at Galatia, Paul encourages us to not give up (6:9), and to continue to work for the good of all (6:10). Again, he reminds us that God's acceptance does not depend on obeying a set of rules, rather it is the death of Jesus that enables the new creation God is bringing about (6:14-15).

When we hear figures like those from the ABS Census of falling affiliation to the faith we are committed to, perhaps it is tempting to withdraw, to give up.

But we have to acknowledge that for far too long the church has expected its place in society. We have shouted our demands into the world (in many places, we are still trying that approach) - but the world has stopped listening.

We have tried to set the rules and we have demanded obedience to them, we have even used fear to enforce them - but the world has stopped complying.

We have been like the people Paul calls out, the "circumcised [who] do not themselves obey the law" (6:13) - that is, we have demanded compliance with rules we don't keep ourselves.

So perhaps, just perhaps, before we moan about the decline of the church, it is time to go back to basics - to Jesus - to learn again to travel light, to allow ourselves to be vulnerable, to trust our companions on the way and to simply offer peace and healing to a world that is conflicted and broken.

Perhaps we don't need the latest mission program or evangelistic tool - we just need to get into our streets and meet people, eat with them, share life in all its gore and glory, hold hope, and show by our living that there is a different way to be.

Not everyone will accept us - not everyone will want to hear a message that is a radical reshaping of how we expect the world to work - so we move on.

But in our not giving up, in continuing to work for the good of all, God's way is made known, the kingdom is realised, and we get to celebrate the wonder of God's vision embodied in our community.

Let's pray,

God you call each one of us to set out into your world to love people into your way of being.

Give us courage to leave behind our accumulated baggage and to trust our fellow travellers.

Go before us as we share meals and offer peace into our hurting world.

Give us wisdom to know when to move on.

May all that we say and do point always towards your eternal grace. Amen.
