Gathering

It is only 4 more Sundays until we begin our preparations for Christmas.

In these last few weeks of the Church year, we are thinking about what God's reign is about and how we talk about it in our world today - what are we hoping



for, what are we praying for, and, importantly, what are we *working* towards? Today the readings from the prophet Joel and the Psalm 65 point us towards God's promised restoration. We live in a broken world, and our hearts ache for wholeness - these readings offer a vision of a world restored, a world of abundance and joy.

Light Candle

We light the candle - focussing our attention, allowing ourselves to be drawn to its flame. We look to Jesus, the light of the world, a light that shines even in the darkest of times offering hope and healing.

To which, we might respond today - abundant rain is one thing, but please, we have had enough now for a little while!

But remember, these words were written for a people who lived in an arid environment - rain was a source of life and restoration.

As it is here in our country of great contrasts -

I love a sunburnt country a land of sweeping plains, of ragged mountain ranges, of drought and flooding rains... (My Country, Dorothea Mackellar)

The challenge for us is that the droughts, and the flooding rains, can be devastating for people and livestock and crops - and yet it is the same floods that restore the land and its soil so that livestock and crops can thrive.

So how do we hold together the world of abundance that is promised and celebrated in the Psalm we read earlier and in the reading from Joel?

Let's start with Joel. It is a short book - only 3 chapters.

It is a set of prophetic poems - remember, prophecy is not about telling the future, but about speaking God's truth into the world.

In these poems, Joel refers to other parts of the Hebrew Scriptures and wrestles with those texts as he sees the world around him.

One of the nice things about Joel is that he is not so concerned about Israel's sin as some of the other prophetic writings are - he seems more concerned with making sense of God's promises in the world he sees around him.

In chapter 1, he describes how God has rescued them in the past from natural disaster (a plague of locusts that devastated their crops).

And then, here in chapter 2, he is trying to interpret their present - recognising that God's saving grace and God's promise of restoration sit in the midst of and alongside the reality of the world today - that is, our reality, as broken as it sometimes feels and is, is intertwined with our present and future hope, the promise that God is in our midst (2:27) and at work in the world bringing restoration and pouring out God's spirit on "all flesh" (2:28).

<u>All</u> flesh - women and men, young and old, slave and free (2:28-29) - echoed in Psalm 65:3 - God's promise is for <u>all</u> people. This is an extravagant pouring out of God's divine self into the world that is beyond gender, age or culture and class!

God's promise of abundance and restoration is intertwined with the "portents in the heavens and on the earth" (2:30), the signs, the darkness of the sun and blood of the moon (2:31) - it is not surprising that the people of Jesus' time saw what we know now as a "blood moon" or an eclipse as a sign of coming troubles...

But where many have tried to interpret the words of the prophet to suggest they are signs of end of the world, I want to suggest the prophetic poems here speak wisdom into our lived reality.

Natural disasters do come upon us from time to time.

The sun goes dark, the moon turns red.

Far from pointing to the "end" or the destruction of the world, these signs occur in the midst of our living, and God is present in it all, yearning for us to notice - to turn again towards the way God intends for us, to call on God - and as we do, God's promise is to "save us" (2:32) Psalm 65:5 uses the word "deliverance" - that is, not to rescue us immediately from the perils of the flood or the consequence of locusts eating the crops, but more likely, to save us "from ourselves" - because we know that when we turn towards God, when we attend to the relationships between us, when we attend to our relationship with the earth, there is enough for everyone, there is enough food to eat. And when people are able to live peaceably and to engage in meaningful work, When we are "satisfied with the goodness of your house" (psalm 65:4), the kind of life we yearn for is possible - "life abundant" as Jesus describes it in John 10:10.

Three times, Joel repeats the phrase, "my people shall never again be put to shame". What causes us shame? Usually it is all the things we try to cover up - the times we have done the wrong thing, or not done the right thing, the times we turn away from the path God shows us, the times we bury our heads in the sand.

And these things are part of our lives both as individuals, as groups together, as congregations, as nations.

But in turning towards God, Psalm 65:3 puts it like this:

When deeds of iniquity overwhelm us,

you forgive our transgressions.

And God's promise is that the damage caused in our brokenness can be restored - perhaps not overnight, certainly not magically or without a good deal of hard work from us - restoration is much more complex than God responding instantaneously to our wish list. But I do think that it is about how when we return to the vision God has for "all flesh", when

we shape our lives around that vision, making choices that reflect the love God has for all people and all creatures, then restoration in abundance begins.

And as restoration unfolds, beauty is restored, the productivity of the soil is restored (Psalm 65:11-13), and God's people "will never again be put to shame".

So let me sum up...

God promises abundance, the scriptures speak of the earth being restored - but it is not something that happens by magic.

It is inextricably linked with people, you and I, turning towards God, and shaping our lives in a way that reflects God's intention for the world. So:

What does it mean for you to recognise God's spirit poured out on <u>all</u> flesh? (Joel 2:28 and Psalm 65:2)

What does it mean for you to be satisfied with the goodness of what we have (Psalm 65:4)?

What does it mean for you to shape your life around *God's* vision for the world - this vision that sees the earth and its peoples in harmony and at peace?

Let us pray...

God fo all Creation,

open our eyes and ears and hearts to your dream for us and our world.

Pour out your spirit here, on us, today.

Inspire in us the humility and courage to turn toward you and to shape our lives in ways that reflect your love and grace in the world. And may we know the joy of your abundant life in our own time and place. Amen.
