
### Gathering

Here is another version of Jesus' family tree from Matthew 1 - this time using the names of people as they might be named in the way of North American First Nations peoples.

### Intro to readings

Our first reading comes from the book of Joshua.

After decades wandering in the wilderness, the people of Israel, under Joshua's leadership, are getting ready to enter the Promised Land.

But this land is not vacant - there are people living there - in towns and cities - so it seems they are going to have to fight for it.

### Reading: Joshua 2:1-21

Then Joshua son of Nun sent two men secretly from Shittim as spies, saying, 'Go, view the land, especially Jericho.' So they went, and entered the house of a prostitute whose name was Rahab, and spent the night there. <sup>2</sup>The king of Jericho was told, 'Some Israelites have come here tonight to search out the land.' <sup>3</sup>Then the king of Jericho sent orders to Rahab, 'Bring out the men who have come to you, who entered your house, for they have come only to search out the whole land.' <sup>4</sup>But the woman took the two men and hid them. Then she said, 'True, the men came to me, but I did not know where they came from. <sup>5</sup>And when it was time to close the gate at dark, the men went out. Where the men went I do not know. Pursue them quickly, for you can overtake them.' <sup>6</sup>She had, however, brought them up to the roof and hidden them with the stalks of flax that she had laid out on the roof. <sup>7</sup>So the men pursued them on the way to the Jordan as far as the fords. As soon as the pursuers had gone out, the gate was shut.

- <sup>8</sup> Before they went to sleep, she came up to them on the roof <sup>9</sup>and said to the men: 'I know that the Lord has given you the land, and that dread of you has fallen on us, and that all the inhabitants of the land melt in fear before you. <sup>10</sup>For we have heard how the Lord dried up the water of the Red Sea before you when you came out of Egypt, and what you did to the two kings of the Amorites that were beyond the Jordan, to Sihon and Og, whom you utterly destroyed. <sup>11</sup>As soon as we heard it, our hearts failed, and there was no courage left in any of us because of you. The Lord your God is indeed God in heaven above and on earth below. <sup>12</sup>Now then, since I have dealt kindly with you, swear to me by the Lord that you in turn will deal kindly with my family. Give me a sign of good faith <sup>13</sup>that you will spare my father and mother, my brothers and sisters, and all who belong to them, and deliver our lives from death.' <sup>14</sup>The men said to her, 'Our life for yours! If you do not tell this business of ours, then we will deal kindly and faithfully with you when the Lord gives us the land.'
- 15 Then she let them down by a rope through the window, for her house was on the outer side of the city wall and she resided within the wall itself. 16 She said to them, 'Go towards the hill country, so that the pursuers may not come upon you. Hide yourselves there for three days, until the pursuers have returned; then afterwards you may go on your way.' 17 The men said to her, 'We will be released from this oath that you have made us swear to you 18 if we invade the land and you do not tie this crimson cord in the window through which you let us down, and you do not gather into your house your father and mother, your brothers, and all your family. 19 If any of you go out of the doors of your house into the street, they shall be responsible for their own death, and we shall be innocent; but if a hand is laid upon any who are with you in the house, we shall bear the responsibility for their death. 20 But if you tell this business of ours, then we shall be released from this oath that you made us swear to you.' 21 She said, 'According to your words, so be it.' She sent them away and they departed. Then she tied the crimson cord in the window.

#### Reading: Luke 1:39-45

<sup>39</sup> In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, <sup>40</sup>where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. <sup>41</sup>When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leapt in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy

Spirit <sup>42</sup>and exclaimed with a loud cry, 'Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. <sup>43</sup>And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? <sup>44</sup>For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leapt for joy. <sup>45</sup>And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfilment of what was spoken to her by the Lord.'

For the Word of God in Scripture, for the Word of God among us, for the Word of God within us,

Thanks be to God!

#### Reflection

Let us pray...

God of our ancestors,

loving God, from generation to generation,

we hear stories today both familiar and perhaps not so much.

Open our hearts and minds to receive your story

and deepen our understanding and our commitment to show more of your love in the world we encounter. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen.

So how does Rahab earn her place in Jesus' family tree?

Rahab lives in Jericho, one of the towns the people of Israel will need to destroy in order to control the land God has given them.

Today, I don't want to go into the issues around how this part of Israel's history is read and understood by indigenous peoples - suffice to say, that God's supposed instruction to God's people to take the land and kill all its inhabitants is deeply problematic - we might come back to that another time...

For now, let's meet Rahab. She is a Canaanite, a foreigner to the people of Israel, a citizen of Jericho.

The Israelite spies are staying in her home.

Most English translations of the Bible, describe Rahab in Joshua 2:2 as a "prostitute" - and many scholars, in reflecting on Rahab's behaviour, have focused on her profession and so not expected any loyalty from her.

But some scholars today suggest that the translation is not accurate, and that Rahab was not a prostitute but an inn keeper - which would also explain why the spies were in her home; and the presence of flax on her roof (Josh 2:6) and crimson cord (Josh 2:18, 21) may indicate that she was also involved in the textile trade, a business woman.

Sex worker, inn-keeper or business woman, Rahab is smart.

She quickly reads the situation she is in and, in effect, she plays both sides in order to secure her own safety and that of her wider family.

She tells her own king's men that the spies are not with her any more - while she hides them on her roof - and then sends the king's men in the opposite direction. Some might say, that was treason!

She then negotiates with the spies and demands protection - for herself and her family (Josh 2:13).

In the midst of these negotiations she speaks in a way that is remarkably well-informed about what God has done for the people of Israel in rescuing them from Egypt, and the fierceness of the Israelite army as it has begun to secure the land (Josh 2:8-11).

And once she has secured what she needs, she then ensures the spies escape safely and can return to their camp (Josh 2:15-16).

In the ensuing invasion, Rahab and her family were indeed rescued and protected from the destruction of Jericho (Josh 6:22-25) - remember Joshua's army marched around the walls until the walls collapsed (one wonders can only assume Rahab's house that was located within the walls was destroyed when the walls fell). The Scriptures record that Rahab was brought out of the city as promised and "her family has lived in Israel ever since" (Josh 6:25).

Rahab, a foreigner in Israel, then settles and Matthew's gospel tells us she married Salmon and had a son, Boaz who we'll meet next week when we encounter Ruth.

So what might we learn from Rahab?

It seems Rahab is a single woman, trying to make her way in the world.

When the spies arrive, she is vulnerable.

She takes a risk in protecting them, and uses that situation to ensure she and her family will be protected. The first risk was courageous in itself, but to then make demands of the invaders is even more so.

It is tempting to judge Rahab - and in many ways, she is judged already in the way she is described and the way our English translation holds her in describing her as a prostitute. It is tempting to judge her for her treachery.

But there are women in the world today who have to act to protect their families. I can't imagine what it is like in Ukraine or Syria or the Congo where invading, violent, usually men, threaten the safety of families who are simply trying to get on with their lives. And, I wonder how many women in the world today are judged because we have preconceived ideas about sex workers, or because they are single and childless, or because they have had to make hard decision for the sake of their families? How many women do we overlook, failing to see the successful businesses they are running?

How many women do we judge rather than celebrating their wisdom, their courage, their street-smarts?

When Mary discovers she is pregnant, she goes to visit her cousin, Elizabeth. Elizabeth is much older and was thought to be beyond child-bearing age and yet she is also pregnant. The story doesn't tell us why Mary goes to Elizabeth except that the angel had told Mary of Elizabeth's pregnancy and perhaps she wanted to see for herself. Perhaps the two women were close and Mary hoped she could find sanctuary but I imagine it was still a risk for Mary to disclose her predicament, even to Elizabeth. And then, at the sound of Mary's voice, Elizabeth's unborn child gives her a good kick (Luke 1:41), and Elizabeth proclaims loudly - the Greek phrase means "megaphone" - she proclaims loudly the blessing Mary is and carries (Luke 1:42).

"Blessed is she who believed that there would be fulfilment of what was spoken to her by the Lord." (Luke 1:45) There is no judgement from Elizabeth, she simply names and celebrates Mary's faithfulness.

Luke's account tells us that the Holy Spirit is active here - speaking through Elizabeth (Luke 1:41) and working through Mary (Luke 1:35).

Beyond the assumptions and expectations of the world, beyond our temptation to judge and condemn, God's Spirit is moving, speaking, challenging, calling. How will we respond?

Reflective Prayer
Advent is a time of waiting,
a time when life is real

but not fully made known, a time to reflect on the past, to learn from the great story,

to listen and wrestle with the harsh reality of life then and now.

Today we remember Rahab, a strong, courageous woman, who recognises what she needs to do to save her family, she takes risks and is bold in her words and actions.

Her reward is to be named in the family line of Jesus.

Jesus, who is our deliverer, our shepherd, our guide, our peacemaker.

We give thanks for the story of Rahab, for the wonder of humanity and the amazing reality that you love us so much you sent Jesus into the world so that we might know you and come to follow in the way of Jesus.

Help us to be bold and courageous as we share the good news of Jesus, shining your light for all to see.

So be it.

Amen.
