Listening for God's Voice

Story - Jed and Roy McCoy

Do you know who the baby is in the story? What was go in on between these two brothers? They were fighting? What do you think helped them to be friends again? Their lives were changed when they met Jesus.

When the angels told the shepherd about Jesus, they said he was the Prince of Peace. Sometimes it is hard for us, when we get angry about something, or we don't get what we want - but Jesus teaches us to try to look out for other people and to try and find a way to get along with people, even people we don't agree with or don't like very much. And if we can do that, our world will be a much more peace-filled place.

Reading: John 1:1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ²He was in the beginning with God. ³All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

- ⁶ There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ⁹The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.
- ¹⁰ He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. ¹¹He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. ¹²But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.
- ¹⁴ And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

For the Word of God in Scripture, for the Word of God among us, for the Word of God within us,

Reflection

God of Love, move among us now, softening hearts, opening ears and eyes, strengthening us and giving us courage to respond to your way of being in the world. Amen.

Why are you here this morning?

When many in our community have decided that Church is not for them, why are you here? Particularly today, of all days, when there is lunch to prepare, parties to go to, fun to be had - most of which bears no relevance to or relationship with what Church is about - or so it seems...

Maybe you have been dragged along and don't get to open your presents until you have been to church (as it was in our family for decades!).

Perhaps you know why you are here - and for that, I am grateful!

But for many of us, and I include myself every now and again, we have come because there is something in this understanding of life and faith that draws us - something that compels us. And the celebration of the birth of Jesus seems to capture some of our hopes and dreams in a way that other celebrations don't seem to.

Maybe it is about wanting to believe that light banishes darkness, that always, no matter how hard life becomes, there is always a flicker of light, a shard of hope that draws us on. Maybe it is about wanting to belong somewhere - knowing that there is something here that will embrace even me.

At Christmas time, it is easy to get caught up in the expectations of joyful celebrations, most of which seem to come at substantial financial, and often environmental, cost.

And for many, the celebrations mean putting on a brave face and masking the pain of whatever life has thrown at them.

Over the past weeks, I have been contemplating the idea of "risking delight". Risking delight.

It recognises that joy is not just about being happy or dancing about the room, although that might be part of it.

It also recognises that naming the realities of life, particularly naming the challenges, or the things that cause us pain, lamenting injustice and weeping with people who grieve, is indeed the beginning of being able to risk delighting in the world Jesus came to love and to serve.

The writer of the gospel attributed to John doesn't bother with the stories of angels and shepherd and wise ones, or even the virgin birth. This gospel writer skips over the what and how of Jesus' birth and leaps into a much more poetic description of the why.

And in this poetic description of why, the writer points to both the light banishing darkness (John 1:5), and the naming of the way Jesus came into the world but was unrecognised and unaccepted (John 1:10-11).

And at the same time, there is this affirmation, that the one who is present at the shaping of the cosmos, dwells amongst us - the word in Greek is more like "pitches a tent" amongst us - and that anyone who turns towards this tent-pitcher is embraced, belongs, is considered family (John 1:12-13).

The writer of John's gospel is certain, that as this tent is pitched, as Jesus comes amongst us, we have seen what he calls, "the glory of God" (John 1:14). "Glory" is a way of describing a presence - the presence of God - the being of God - the embodiment that is, as John describes, "full of grace and truth".

Perhaps too, the story of Jed & Roy taps into some of our yearning that our relationships can be restored, that we can learn to relate to one another in healthier ways, or at least we can learn to curb our own grumpiness or selfishness or our desire to win at all costs so that we can grow and stay in relationships that enable us to flourish together.

If any of that resonates with you, then I hope that you will come back again.

Or, if not here, then somewhere where you can explore more about the relationship that God invites us into (that is, that idea of dwelling amongst us) and the life to which Jesus calls us. Because I do know that as we embrace God's presence amongst us, and as we strive to embody love, grace and truth, our world, our communities, our families, our own lives flourish.

And isn't that what we long for?

Isn't that why we are here? - because we long for the flourishing of our own lives and the lives of the people around us and the creation of which we are a part. And somehow we have figured out that this story, of a baby born to an unwed teenage girl in an out-of-theway place on the other side of the world a couple of thousand years ago, might just have something to do with the path we are looking for.

May you find in the birth of Christ, the light, the hope, the restoration and flourishing for which we yearn.

And in that discovery, may your life be shaped in such a way as to share such flourishing with the world around you.

Let us pray...

We offer you a new song, God. It is a song of thanksgiving, a song of regret, a song of passion, a song of praise, a song of lament, and sometimes it is a song of joy. We thank you for the ways in which you hear our prayers, whatever their tone. And we pray that as you continue to dwell amongst us, you will draw us to your grace and truth that we also might embody your love in the world. Amen.
