Gathering

As the celebrations of Christmas and the New Year fade into the past, and as the summer months still stretch before us, I want to invite us, before the year gets mad again, to stop and consider who we are called to be and what we are called to do.

In the reading from Isaiah this morning, we will hear God calling us to "pay attention"!

So, just for now, try and lay aside whatever it is that distracts

you - whether it is worry about the coming week or month or year, whether it is concern for loved ones (we will remember them in our prayers later in the service), whether it is longing for this moment to end so you can get to the beach - try to bring yourself to this moment, to this space, and open yourself to the moving of God amongst us.

Light Candle

We light the candle - focussing our attention, allowing ourselves to be drawn to its flame. We look to Jesus, the light of the world, a light that shines even in the darkest of times offering hope and healing.

Reading: Isaiah 49:1-7

Listening for God's Voice

Reading: John 1:29-42

²⁹ The next day [John] saw Jesus coming towards him and declared, 'Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! ³⁰This is he of whom I said, "After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me." ³¹I myself did not know him; but I came baptising with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel.' ³²And John testified, 'I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. ³³I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptise with water said to me, "He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptises with the Holy Spirit." ³⁴And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God.'

³⁵ The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, ³⁶and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, 'Look, here is the Lamb of God!' ³⁷The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. ³⁸When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, 'What are you looking for?' They said to him, 'Rabbi' (which translated means Teacher), 'where are you staying?' ³⁹He said to them, 'Come and see.' They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. ⁴⁰One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. ⁴¹He first found his brother Simon and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' (which is translated Anointed). ⁴²He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas' (which is translated Peter).

Reflection

Faithful God, you invite us to be curious.

Over the past few weeks, I have been reflecting on the past couple of years as I plan for 2023.

We are slowly emerging from the worst of a global pandemic - and, while we are still careful and perhaps more aware of our responsibility to keep ourselves and others safe from contagious bugs, we are starting to travel and attend concerts and movies again and to find ourselves in more crowded spaces.

So I have been looking at our mission plan - the document that guides our life together - a plan we revised 2 years ago and then did some more work on about this time last year - a plan that has been interrupted several times but the restrictions of the pandemic.

What I notice, is that the plan has much to say about *doing* - and, in spite of the pandemic, we have done much of what it speaks about.

We have new accessible facilities here, and there are new facilities in the process of construction at Jamberoo. And we have made these facilities available to our neighbours. We have tried different forms of gatherings - discussion evenings, dinner at Jamberoo. But now it looks like the plan describes much of what we *do* but offers little in the way of charting a course for our future together.

As I ponder the question of "what now?", the questions that keep coming back to me are: what are we learning and how are we growing?

In the midst of all that we are doing, what are we learning and how are we growing?

You see, it is tempting as we get older to think that all our learning and growing is done - especially when physically it seems we are shrinking, and the mental effort of learning new things gets harder and harder.

But as followers of Jesus, our learning and growing never stops.

Perhaps it might help if we didn't think of "growing" as something that gets bigger, but rather as our life in Christ, our faith, as getting *deeper*.

Maybe then we can ask the questions: what are we learning and how are we growing?

Maybe spend 2 minutes talking with the person next to you - can you answer those questions, or how do those questions make you feel?

And maybe there is a further question - how do we remain open to what God wants to teach us?

I love the way the prophet Isaiah has God saying: "Pay attention, you peoples from far away!" (49:1) You can almost imagine God saying those words in God's best "teacher-voice"!

And then the prophet reminds us that God has created us - knitted us together in our mother's womb - known us intimately from the time of conception, shaped us and drawn us to Godself.

But we get tired, and we wonder whether our hard work is actually achieving anything. As we get older, we sometimes find ourselves wondering what life has been about or is about.

Into all of this, the prophet says something that I think speaks directly to us and our mission plan...

In Isaiah 49:6, Isaiah suggests that God invites us to something more:

that it is not enough that we look after our own people as important as that is, God invites us to *be* a light to *all* the nations (49:6).

And even though it sometimes feels like we are despised, ignore or looked down upon, the prophet assures us that people will take notice and kings and rulers will return to God (49:7).

So I am wondering whether the question we now need to be asking ourselves, rather than what are we doing, or what should we do:

is more like, how are we together *being* "a light to the nations", a light to our community - so what is it about us, who we are and what we do, that shines light into the world around us?

And I am wondering whether this is where we are most needing to learn and grow?

So a couple of things to ponder from the other readings...

In the gospel attributed to John, we hear John proclaim, "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!" (1:29)

[Now it gets a bit confusing here - the gospel-writer is John, not the same John as the John being described who, in other gospels is called John the Baptiser - I'll come back ti that...].

In John's gospel, Jesus is explicitly compared to the Passover lamb. In John's gospel, Jesus dies at the same time the passover lambs are being prepared for the meal. But the passover lamb had nothing to do with a sacrifice for sin - it was about a sacrifice for freedom, the passover lamb was to guarantee Israel's freedom from slavery. And in John's statement, "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!", the word "sin" is singular - implying more than a moralistic sense of forgiveness or punishment for wrong-doing, it is about freeing the world for life in abundance (John 10:10).

So when we speak of Jesus to our friends and neighbours, may we be less about moralistic judgment and more about a call to freedom and life.

In John's gospel, this John is not known as the baptiser, that part is almost played down. Instead, John is a *witness* who testifies to what he has seen and heard in his encounter with Jesus. May we learn to share our own experiences, to be witnesses to what we have seen and heard in our own encounters with Jesus.

And then, look at the encounter between Jesus and John's disciples.

When they start following Jesus, he asks them, "What are you looking for?" (1:38). They acknowledge him as a teacher, ("Rabbi", (1:39)) but he doesn't teach them, he invites them to "come and see" (1:39) - come and experience, come, listen and learn together - and in that experience, they are transformed - Simon is given a new name (1:42).

So perhaps for us it is not just about telling people about Jesus, but about inviting our friends to "come and see" for themselves trusting that their own encounter with Jesus will transform lives.

Lastly, in Paul's letter to the Corinthian church, if we read that letter as if it were addressed to us today, Paul speaks of the way that our speech and knowledge are enriched by the grace of God (1:5), that our witness to the Christ is strengthened (1:6) and that we are not lacking in any gift (1:7).

You have heard me say before that I firmly believe that we have all that we need to be the people God calls us to be. And even though we might feel tired or that we have missed the boat in some way:

Paul reminds us, that we have all we need to be the people God calls us to be; Jesus invites us to experience his life and teaching and to be transformed; and Isaiah reminds us that we are called to be light to the nations.

So what are you learning and how are you growing? What do we need to learn together, how are we growing together? How are we light to the community around us, to our friends and family?

Let us pray...

Light of the world, you call us to reflect your light into the world around us.

Remind us of your grace,

enrich our speech and knowledge and give us courage to invite those around us to "come and see",

enable us to use the gifts you have given us

that we may draw ever closer to you and your way for the world.

In Christ's name, we pray. Amen.
