

God's Reign Among Us


Gathering

Last week we heard Jesus say, "the kingdom of heaven is at hand"; the kingdom of heaven is here (Matthew 4:17). And we talked about the kind of community, the kinds of values, that reflect that kingdom, God's reign, God's way, God's dream. As Matthew's gospel moves on, the gospel-writer records several chunks of Jesus' teaching - and this first chunk, Matthew 5-7 has come to be known as the "Sermon on the Mount". And the beginning of this chunk of teaching holds a vision of the community to which we are called, and speaks directly to our character.

These passages, both, from Micah and from the gospel attributed to Matthew are pretty well known. Micah's words, particularly the last verse (6:8) has become a bit of a catch-cry for various social action groups. And Jesus' teaching, this first part, has become known as the Beatitudes (meaning "blessed").

Let's look first at Micah.

Micah is one of the later prophets, speaking to a nation who is now doing it a bit tough. The southern kingdom of Judah had not been exiled like their northern neighbours but they had been invaded. But once the invaders had retreated, King Hezekiah had overseen dramatic growth in the kingdom - there had been a great increase in the population, the economy had transformed from a reliance on bartering to international trading, literacy rates had risen.¹

But that also meant that there had been an increase in corruption and, as we know, as wealth increases, those unable to keep up, the poor and vulnerable in the community were being ignored. Have a look at what Micah says about all that in chapters 2 and 3. Chapter 6 is set in a kind of courtroom, where God is basically saying to the people of the southern kingdom - what do you have to say for yourselves? I have brought you out fo Egypt, stood by you and cared for you, and look at what you have now become! (6:4-5)

So what should they do?

Burnt offerings and religious piety are not going to cut it! (6:6-7)

In the midst of what feels like turmoil and upheaval, Micah reminds them of their covenant, with their God. This God, who has held you and shaped you, saved you and cared for you has already shown you.

What matters is how you live - *do* justice, *love* kindness, *walk* humbly with God (6:8). These are active, practical things.

Do justice - don't just pray for it, don't just demand it, do justice yourself - and I don't mean the kind of justice that issues punishment for wrong-doing. We've talked about that before. God's justice is all about restored relationships. Do whatever it takes, whatever needs to be done, to restore relationships.

Love kindness or, in some translations, mercy - the Hebrew here is both - be kind, be merciful - in our actions, in our words, most especially in our words.

Walk humbly with God - humility is so hard for so many of us - we can be humble on our own terms, when it doesn't cost us anything, and humility is very much undervalued in our society - but gee it is tempting sometimes to want to blow our own trumpet, especially when dealing with someone who is blowing their own...

But if we are in any doubt about what kind of character God is calling us to grow into, the Beatitudes make it even more plain. Jesus is speaking to his disciples - but it becomes clear that the crowds are gathering and listening in. Luke also records this first part of Jesus' teaching (Luke 6:17-26), although he makes them much more direct.

"Blessed" (Gk = μακάριοι) - it isn't the best word for us today - not easily translated into English. "Blessed" for us, as we have see recently by the then Prime Minister who got himself into a pickle when he suggested he was blessed - seems to carry now something of the sense of a reward which isn't what the Greek means. Some translations use "happy" - happy are the poor - but that is even less satisfactory.

Perhaps something like "content" is closer.

So rather than thinking of this series of statements as God offering a reward to those who are poor or grieving or if we are meek and so on, perhaps we can think of them more as painting a picture for us of how God intends for us, as a community, as individuals, to care for each other.

So those who are poor or persecuted are held in the embrace of love (5:3,10) - we hold them, we ensure that they know they belong.

Those who mourn are comforted (5:4) - we comfort them, we show up for them and show we care.

We celebrate the meek, the merciful, the pure in heart, the peacemakers rather than putting them down or dismissing their presence amongst us because these people point us to God (5:5,7,8,9).

We ensure that those who give their lives for the pursuit of righteousness, encouraging us all to be better, to care more deeply, to seek forgiveness and healing and reconciliation, we ensure that they are supported and nurtured (5:6)

And when we ourselves are persecuted for the people we embrace or the stand we take, well we know we are on the right track (5:12). So we hang in there, we support one another, and we encourage one another to stay the journey.

Each of these statements invites us to think about our own character - how we respond in different circumstances and to the differences in many the people we encounter from day to day. It has been said that these statements might be thought of as the "Be-attitudes" - and teach us to develop our character, our *attitudes* along lines of compassion, meekness, mercy, creators of peace, yearning for righteousness and purity of heart. Or as Micah puts it: justice, kindness, humility.

How well do we reflect these attitudes in our lives - in the things we do, *and* in the things we say?

My guess is that we all do OK when things are going well - but we begin to struggle when confronted with differences or people or situations that we are not entirely comfortable with, when we are pushed beyond our safe experiences.

We become less confident, sometimes even fearful, and it is easy to speak with less care both to one another and to our friends and neighbours.

Last week we recognised that our nation still struggles with its relationship with the First Nations of this land. Perhaps some of you were confronted by saying sorry or recognising that we continue to benefit from systemic injustice that impacts our indigenous brothers and sisters most directly.

What does it mean for us to be people of justice, kindness and humility? What does it mean for us to be meek, merciful, peacemakers? How can we remain curious with one another, listening deeply to the hearts that learn for righteousness, working it out with one another?

In the midst of a changing world, in the midst of corruption and the threat of being overwhelmed, Micah speaks to God's people, to us; Jesus teaches his disciples, you and I; to return to who it is that God calls us and intends for us to be - people who embody the justice of God, and God's kindness and humility, who seek to grow in ourselves as individuals and as a community, the kind of attitudes and values Jesus teaches and embodies.

Perhaps this week, you might take some time, to write down the words from Micah 6:8 and/or Matthew 5 - highlight the attitudes or aspects of character that stand out for you, and spend some time reflecting on the ones you can celebrate in yourself - and give thanks to God for them; and then spend some time reflecting on the ones you might need help with - and ask God to help with those. And if you are unsure, talk them over with a trusted friend - try to stay open and curious, and let God's Spirit lead you.
