Listening for God's Voice

Reading: Deuteronomy 30:15-20

¹⁵ See, I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and adversity. ¹⁶If you obey the commandments of the Lord your God that I am commanding you today, by loving the Lord your God, walking in his ways, and observing his commandments, decrees, and ordinances, then you shall live and become numerous, and the Lord your God will bless you in the land that you are entering to possess. ¹⁷But if your heart turns away and you do not hear, but are led astray to bow down to other gods and serve them, ¹⁸I declare to you today that you shall perish; you shall not live long in the land that you are crossing the Jordan to enter and possess. ¹⁹I call heaven and earth to witness against you today that I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Choose life so that you and your descendants may live, ²⁰Ioving the Lord your God, obeying him, and holding fast to him; for that means life to you and length of days, so that you may live in the land that the Lord swore to give to your ancestors, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob.

Reading: Matthew 5:21-37

- ²¹ 'You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, "You shall not murder"; and "whoever murders shall be liable to judgement." ²²But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgement; and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council; and if you say, "You fool", you will be liable to the hell of fire.

 ²³So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, ²⁴leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift. ²⁵Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are on the way to court with him, or your accuser may hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison.

 ²⁶Truly I tell you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny.
- ²⁷ 'You have heard that it was said, "You shall not commit adultery." ²⁸But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. ²⁹If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. ³⁰And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to go into hell.
- ³¹ 'It was also said, "Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce." ³²But I say to you that anyone who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, causes her to commit adultery; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery.
- ³³ 'Again, you have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, "You shall not swear falsely, but carry out the vows you have made to the Lord." ³⁴But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, ³⁵or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. ³⁶And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. ³⁷Let your word be "Yes, Yes" or "No, No"; anything more than this comes from the evil one.

Seasons of the Spirit, Resources for Epiphany 6, 12 February 2023, p.168

What brings you life?

Maybe it is a swim in the ocean or a walk in the bush.

Maybe it is your family around you or a meal shared with friends.

Maybe, too, it is time spent reading and pondering the Scriptures or praying or singing some rousing hymns.

What brings you life?

The readings before us today, invite us into an interplay between the law and life. That reading from Matthew 5 is hard to hear and it is no accident that those who put the lectionary together put it alongside the passage from Deuteronomy 30. As we consider the words of Jesus, we need to hear them alongside what he has already

As we consider the words of Jesus, we need to hear them alongside what he has already been saying to us in the previous part of Matthew 5 as well as what is said in the Hebrew scriptures in which Jesus was deeply immersed.

The writers of the torah, put the words we heard in the first reading in the mouth of Moses, as Moses says farewell to the people he has led out of Egypt and through the wilderness, to the people who will now go on without him to the land God has promised. Moses reminds them of God's covenant with them, and of their responsibilities under that covenant - walk in the ways God has shown you, keep God's commandments, that path will lead to life. But if you forget, if you take another path, it will lead to suffering and death. And so before you is a choice - and he implores them to choose life - not just for their own sake but for the sake of their families and the generations to come (30:19).

What happened, then, over centuries, is that the law, God's commandments, became rigid. And by the time Jesus is teaching, he is speaking to a world where a person's righteousness was measured by the degree to which you were able to keep the law.

So, remember last week, Jesus speaks about being salt and light in the world. And he encourages us to reach for righteous-justice which is expressed not only in keeping the letter of the law but in practical expressions of love and care for others - offering food and clothing and protection to people who are more vulnerable in our communities, and attending to the systems of our society that oppress or exclude, flavouring and illuminating the world with hope and healing.

So it is from that point that Jesus continues, in the confronting terms we have just heard. And, when we look closely, we see again that what Jesus is saying is that it is not keeping the letter of the law that is important, it is keeping its essence. And he uses examples that come from the foundational commandments, the 10 Commandments given by God to the people of Israel (Deuteronomy 20).

Murder is horrendous, but, he says, it is not just about murder, we need to attend to the anger and the insults that are the spark to behaviour that ends in that kind of tragedy (5:21-22).

If you have an issue, a disagreement, with someone, then sort it out - don't let it fester until it explodes - usually in an unhelpful way - go to your brother or sister and have an honest and open conversation about what it is bothering you (5:23-26) - listen to each other and seek a resolution.

So too with adultery - its not just the act of sleeping with someone else's wife - but it starts when you look at a woman with lust (5:27-28). And here we need to remember that Jesus at this point is mainly speaking to men. And I want us to notice that Jesus places responsibility squarely on the shoulders of the men doing the lusting - there is no reference here to women dressing in certain ways or leading men on - this is all about taking responsibility for our own thoughts, emotions and responses and ensuring they are kept under control.

Most commentators agree that Jesus' use of an extreme response in tearing your eye out or cutting an arm off (5:29-30) is used for emphasis - in no way did Jesus expect us to take that literally but he did expect us to respond strongly and intentionally to control our propensity to make ill-considered choices.

Jesus teaching on divorce (5:31-32) has also caused much angst. Here again it is important to understand the context and time - Jesus speaks into a system that allowed men to divorce their wives and it seems that men were seeking, and being granted divorce, without any reason except, perhaps, that the husband had grown tired of his wife. That might be OK for us today but this was a time when if a man divorced his wife then he was no longer required to care for her or protect her. If she had no other family who would take her in, she was effectively abandoned; and many wouldn't take a divorced woman in because her divorce brought shame on the family. Jesus is saying, adultery is one thing, but you don't get to toss your wife out just because you have decided you don't want her around any more.

Now before I go on, I need to make a couple of things clear.

In today's world, legally, divorce is available to us without needing to give a reason. The breakdown of any marriage is complex and painful for everyone involved and the community that surrounds them.

But if a relationship is endangering someone's health in any way - physically, emotionally, spiritually - then it is absolutely appropriate to seek help and, if it can't be resolved, to end that relationship. And that divorce then does not prevent anyone, in time, from finding and building a new relationship.

Lastly, Jesus speaks to swearing of oaths and vows (see Leviticus 19:12; Numbers 30:2; Deuteronomy 23:21). Again, it is not about whether our commitment is embellished with a vow - it is whether we do what we say. So - say "yes" or "no" - the rest is superfluous.

SO what might we take from all this?

In addition to the specifics Jesus gives, there is an over-arching sense he is trying to evoke in us.

Every moment of every day, we are faced with choices - and sometimes, we have to make several choices all at the one time from a range of options.

We all know that in today's world, sometimes the number of options can be almost overwhelming, and the implications of our options (practical, ethical or moral) are not always clear.

Sometimes the choices we are faced with are big - moving house, changing careers, choosing a life-partner or, indeed, ending a relationship.

Sometimes the choices might seem trivial in comparison, but can nevertheless be paralysing.

I remember when I came back home after living in Asia for 3 years, I went to the supermarket to do a bit of a shop and I got to the breakfast cereal aisle. I stood at the top of the aisle gazing down what seemed to me to be an endless array of boxes, and I was unable to move. So many choices of breakfast cereal - I hadn't seen anything like it in the time I had been away. I bought some bread for toast and went home...

A few weeks later, since I was almost broke, I decided that instead of buying a car, I would buy a bicycle. So I went to a bike shop in Warrawong and again, was overwhelmed by the number of bikes available - I just wanted one with pedals and brakes!

Some would say we are blessed with choice!

We might also say we are cursed with the number of choices we have or, at least, the number of people trying to tell us what choices we should make - what will make us happy, or make us feel good.

But I wonder how often we are conscious of the choices we are making? How often do we stop and ask ourselves what is motivating our choices? And what happens when we stop and ask, will this bring life?

And it goes even further - it is not just about whether a particular choice will bring life to me as an individual, God's instruction through Moses is clear that it is about making choices that will bring life to the people around me and the generations to come.

So what choices are you making?

And how do you make them?

Will you try, as you go about your days this week, as you are confronted with options, ask yourself, what will bring life? Is this life-giving - to me and to the world around me?

I am grateful that you make the choice to come here and gather with the people of God. I am hopeful that we choose together to be salt and light in our communities and to work as hard as we can to follow the path Jesus has shown us.

Together, we choose to gather around this table where, in symbol and sign, we are reminded of that path, a path of self-giving and loving; where, bread and juice speak to us and to the world of generosity, grace and life in abundance.

Choose life - so you and the world around you will know of the life to which God calls us.

Prayer for Others (Helen Laidlaw)

Loving God,

Each of us has different knowledge of who you are — That eternal Mystery who created our beautiful world and gave us life. We are all unique and we know that you require us to accept and love each other. Sometimes this is not easy and we need your help to forgive and see others as you see them. Mother Teresa of Calcutta wrote a wonderful prayer which included: *People are often unreasonable and self-centred. Forgive them anyway.* Thank you for this reminder that we are not working for our church or our community but firstly we are doing God's work in the world.

We also pray for the many women in our world whose rights are being removed, or who live under oppressive male domination.

We pray for the peacemakers in this world of war and aggression and cruelty – may your Holy Spirit infuse them with your power. May justice rule in so many unjust and genocidal situations.

May we be peacemakers in our own circle of family and church and community – forgiving and actively moving out of our self-centred ways.

We also pray for the families of the many people who have drowned in the last few weeks in Australian seas and waterways.

We pray for your comfort for parents who have lost a child, either in an accident or with serious illness.

We pray for those whose lives have been decimated by floods – and we ask that our scientists and politicians make good decisions in combating climate change.

We also pray for the people who weep for wasted opportunities, and help them hope for the future.

Be with those who are those suffering from long term illnesses and we claim Jesus' promise that they shall be comforted. We thank you when healing occurs, and for the lifting of burdens. So often we forget to thank you!

As Australians, help us to understand the injustices which have been suffered by our aboriginal people – our First People – and work towards righting wrongs and developing new strategies. As the controversy continues about the Voice and the referendum, help us to be your voice. Only you can show us how to do this, and work in a community which is sometimes unaware or uncaring.

Help us to measure our lives against the pattern of JESUS CHRIST, OUR LORD AND SAVIOUR, and depend on you at all times – both good and bad. Amen

Sing - Be God's (Seasons 9-10)

As the bread becomes his body, we can be the living sign.

With God's love, change the world with your life.

Where the world is wounded, be God's healing.

Where the world is weeping, be God's song.

Where there is no tenderness, be God's child.

Where there is loneliness, be God's smile. Where the world is dying, be God's life. Where there is darkness, be God's light.
