Reflect:

1. In the story, who felt good about the clothes: Jessie or her family?

2. What was Jessie frustrated about?

Getting clothes she didn't want / other people making decisions for her.

3. (sarcastically) But shouldn't Jessie be happy to get anything? No? Why? *The clothes weren't right for her/what she liked doing?*

4. Why weren't the clothes right for Jessie?

They were assuming they knew what she wanted without asking her.

5. What should her family have done instead of buying her what they thought she needed?

They should have asked her what she liked or needed?

6. When you give a friend or family member a gift, it feels good, doesn't it? But do you try to think about things you would like, or things they would like?

Ask if they have given someone a perfect gift. What made it perfect for that person? How did it make you feel?

[If that doesn't work] Ask if they have ever received something they didn't want. How did that make them feel?

- 7. What does it mean to be generous? What are some generous acts?
- 8. Can generosity hurt you or the people you're trying to help?

Maybe – if you are giving them things they don't need or want.

What if you send your old clothes to another county but they aren't right for the climate there?

What if you send old books to another country but they aren't in a language anyone speaks?

At UnitingWorld we work with people and churches in other countries to help them in lots of ways. Sometimes they need help accessing clean water or toilets, sometimes they need help to clean up after a cyclone, sometimes they need help running a school for children who otherwise wouldn't be able to go to school.

What do you think UnitingWorld should do if one of our overseas church partners needs our help? Ask what kind of help they might need from us.

The best way for UnitingWorld to work with overseas churches is not to assume we know what they need. We aren't better than them, just because we may have more money or opportunities. We have a lot to learn from them too. They are brave, creative, resilient, and strong in faith.

Just like Jessie, our partners know what they need or how to fix a problem and they just need our friendship and fundraising to make those things happen! Our partners are the local church, helping their communities unlock their God-given potential to set themselves free from poverty and injustice. They know their communities so can see simple, inexpensive solutions that we can't.

Prayer

Loving God, you know each one of us, intimately, and you know what we need.

Forgive when we assume what others want or need,

forgive us when we think we know better.

Help us to listen to each other and to respond with gentleness and humility. Amen.

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Listening for God's Voice

Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:12-27

¹² For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body. though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

¹⁴ Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. ¹⁵If the foot were to say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body. 16And if the ear were to say, 'Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body. 17 If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? ¹⁸But as it is. God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. ¹⁹If all were a single member, where would the body be? ²⁰As it is, there are many members, yet one body. 21The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you', nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' 22On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and those members of the body that we think less honourable we clothe with greater honour, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; ²⁴whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honour to the inferior member, ²⁵that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it.

²⁷ Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. .

For the Word of God in Scripture, for the Word of God among us, for the Word of God within us.

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Prayer for Others

God of infinite compassion, from age to age we tell the stories of Jesus' time on earth comforting the suffering, healing the sick, speaking out against injustice, challenging the powerful, and bringing hope to all humanity. Though those feet no longer walk the earth, and those hands no longer rest on the afflicted, we know you still hear the calling of your people, and we bring our prayers for the world in this time.

We pray for our partners raising up women in the church and community and leading a discussion on the biblical basis for gender equality and anti-violence. In the Pacific, where rates of men's violence against women are among the highest in the world, we pray that our partners' messages continue to cut through and change hearts.

Lord God, we pray for UnitingWorld staff and our partners, and the life-changing work that you are doing through our Christian family cross the globe.

We pray for the courage to remain engaged with the messy, broken, beautiful world around us and that we would each find ways to play our part as the body of Christ – whether down the street or the other side of the world. Amen.
