## Introduction to reading...

Today's reading from Genesis picks up the story of Abraham as he is nearing the end of his life. Sarah has died and Abraham realises he needs to find a wife for Isaac. So he sends his servant back to their homeland to find someone from Abraham's own people. This part of Abraham's story is told in Genesis as a narrative but then retold through the voice of Abraham's servant who is sent to find a suitable wife and meets Rebekah at a well. We pick up the story as the servant speaks to Rebekah's father.

## Reading: Genesis 24:34-38, 42-49, 58-67

<sup>34</sup> So he said, 'I am Abraham's servant. <sup>35</sup>The Lord has greatly blessed my master, and he has become wealthy; he has given him flocks and herds, silver and gold, male and female slaves, camels and donkeys. <sup>36</sup>And Sarah my master's wife bore a son to my master when she was old; and he has given him all that he has. <sup>37</sup>My master made me swear, saying, "You shall not take a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites, in whose land I live; <sup>38</sup>but you shall go to my father's house, to my kindred, and get a wife for my son."

<sup>42</sup> 'I came today to the spring, and said, "O Lord, the God of my master Abraham, if now you will only make successful the way I am going! <sup>43</sup>I am standing here by the spring of water; let the young woman who comes out to draw, to whom I shall say, 'Please give me a little water from your jar to drink,' <sup>44</sup>and who will say to me, 'Drink, and I will draw for your camels also'—let her be the woman whom the Lord has appointed for my master's son."

<sup>45</sup> 'Before I had finished speaking in my heart, there was Rebekah coming out with her water-jar on her shoulder; and she went down to the spring, and drew. I said to her, "Please let me drink." <sup>46</sup>She quickly let down her jar from her shoulder, and said, "Drink, and I will also water your camels." So I drank, and she also watered the camels. <sup>47</sup>Then I asked her, "Whose daughter are you?" She said, "The daughter of Bethuel, Nahor's son, whom Milcah bore to him." So I put the ring on her nose, and the bracelets on her arms. <sup>48</sup>Then I bowed my head and worshipped the Lord, and blessed the Lord, the God of my master Abraham, who had led me by the right way to obtain the daughter of my master, tell me; and if not, tell me, so that I may turn either to the right hand or to the left.'

<sup>58</sup>And they called Rebekah, and said to her, 'Will you go with this man?' She said, 'I will.' <sup>59</sup>So they sent away their sister Rebekah and her nurse along with Abraham's servant and his men. <sup>60</sup>And they blessed Rebekah and said to her,

'May you, our sister, become

thousands of myriads;

may your offspring gain possession

of the gates of their foes.'

<sup>61</sup>Then Rebekah and her maids rose up, mounted the camels, and followed the man; thus the servant took Rebekah, and went his way.

<sup>62</sup> Now Isaac had come from Beer-lahai-roi, and was settled in the Negeb. <sup>63</sup>Isaac went out in the evening to walk in the field; and looking up, he saw camels coming. <sup>64</sup>And Rebekah looked up, and when she saw Isaac, she slipped quickly from the camel, <sup>65</sup>and said to the servant, 'Who is the man over there, walking in the field to meet us?' The servant said, 'It is my master.' So she took her veil and covered herself. <sup>66</sup>And the servant told Isaac all the things that he had done. <sup>67</sup>Then Isaac brought her into his mother Sarah's tent. He took Rebekah, and she became his wife; and he loved her. So Isaac was comforted after his mother's death.

Reading: Matthew 11:16-19, 25-30

Jesus has just been told that John the Baptist has been arrested and put in prison. He is speaking to the crowds:

<sup>16</sup> 'But to what will I compare this generation? It is like children sitting in the market-places and calling to one another,

<sup>17</sup> "We played the flute for you, and you did not dance;

we wailed, and you did not mourn."

<sup>18</sup>For John came neither eating nor drinking, and they say, "He has a demon"; <sup>19</sup>the Son of Man came eating and drinking, and they say, "Look, a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of tax-collectors and sinners!" Yet wisdom is vindicated by her deeds.'

<sup>25</sup> At that time Jesus said, 'I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants; <sup>26</sup>yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. <sup>27</sup>All things have been handed over to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.

<sup>28</sup> 'Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. <sup>29</sup>Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. <sup>30</sup>For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.'

For the Word of God in Scripture, for the Word of God among us, for the Word of God within us, *Thanks be to God!* 

## Reflection

Great God, help us to discern your way of love through the many stories unfolding in our lives. Grace us with compassion and openness and lead us to always find our rest and strength in you. Amen.

What are the sacred stories that you tell?

How do we decide what is a sacred story?

For Christians, we believe that the Scriptures contain a particular collection of sacred stories. But we do also draw upon stories of people of faith who have inspired us - people like St Francis of Assisi or Mother Teresa - there stories are told in ways that make them sacred.

Our local congregations often also tell stories of people who have been special in their communities - the ones who were here first, or who contributed to the establishment of the buildings, or the ones who served for decades on the mission committee or who ran the

Sunday School. There is a plaque in the Lecture Hall to a Sunday School teacher that tells a sacred story of his contribution.

Families tell sacred stories.

And other faiths hold their sacred stories.

And First Nations peoples tell sacred stories too.

Some of these stories contain great detail - perhaps not necessarily factually or historically accurate in all their detail - but important nevertheless.

This story of Abraham sending his servant to find Rebekah is a little like that - we can't be sure of all its details but there are a couple of little details to note -

- Isaac's wife is sought from Abraham's homeland, from Abraham's own people not from the land of the Canaanites where he now lived - the so-called "purity" of the Hebrew nation is established and reinforced
- Rebekah is given a choice unusual for an arranged marriage but reinforces her willing participation and points to our choice to engage in the way God intends for us
- Isaac takes Rebekah into his mother's tent Sarah has died and Isaac's action reinforces Rebekah's place in the lineage of the Hebrew people

Sacred stories teach us something about ourselves, about how we came to be, and/or they teach us something about our world and how it came to be.

Some of the stories are accounts of actual events or people, and some are illustrative or metaphors. And some are both - embellished accounts to explain or emphasise.

And then there is another strand of sacred story - those that teach us or offer us wisdom. Again, sometimes these stories are metaphor, or stories about something familiar that are intended to reveal a deeper truth - next week we will begin to engage with Jesus' parables that are a lot like that.

But our sacred stories also contain some more direct words of Jesus.

Today - we hear his grief and frustration as he responds to news that his cousin, John, has been arrested and imprisoned.

He is almost brutal in his assessment of what is going on - you didn't want to celebrate with me, you didn't want to mourn with me. If I fasted, you think I am weird and if I eat you say I eat too much! Yet wisdom is seen in what I do (Matthew 11:19).

He goes on to remind us that wisdom is not always obvious, and people who think they know it all, often are misguided - because wisdom, understanding, knowledge of God is what matters, and that comes in giving our attention to Jesus (Matthew 11:25-27).

And when we do that, when we focus on Jesus, on who he is and what he did, when we stop trying to do it on our own, or stop trying to carry stuff that is simply not our's to carry, and when we take up the way he shows, we discover release, refreshment, rest.

But what makes a story sacred?

Is it sacred only in its telling?

Of course not! It is sacred in who it calls us to be, in how it invites us to reflect its truth in our own living. It is sacred in how we live it out.

Our sacred stories, then, point us back to this table.

The table around which we tell another story - of Jesus taking a path that would lead to his death and to new life; of a love so deep that it meets us in the depth of our pain, our sorrow, our angst, and leads us into transformation and renewal.

"Come to me, all you who are carrying a heavy load, and I will give you rest."

Share my load with me, discover gentleness and humility, discover that together the burden is easier to bear, discover that in this life there is deep peace, rest for our weary souls.

So what are the sacred stories you tell?

What wisdom are you sharing with the people around you?

Perhaps today as we gather around this table, we will discover again the depth of its truth for us and we will find ourselves encouraged to share our sacred stories not only in their telling but in our living.

Let us pray,

Ancient of Days,

from generation to generation we tell sacred stories.

As we listen and learn, may your stories shape us always into being more like the people you have created and called us to be. And may we find the courage to continue to tell your stories in our words and through our lives. Now and always. Amen.

#### Responding

**Sing** - I Heard The Voice of Jesus Say (TIS 585) As we sing, we listen for the voice of Jesus, inviting us to rest, to drink to follow his light...

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "Come unto me and rest; lay down, O weary one, lay down your head upon my breast." I came to Jesus as I was, weary and worn and sad; I found in him a resting-place, and he has made me glad.
