For those who notice these things, we have decided to move away from the readings set out in the lectionary for this time.

Over the next 4 weeks, our worship together will focus around various themes of creation, shaped by a song we have been singing for some time now, called *Creator and Poet*, written by Sandra Sears. Each week, we will take a verse of that song/hymn and reflect on what it might be teaching us about God, about ourselves and about the creation of which we are a part.

Today, we'll explore what it means for God's voice, God' presence, to be known through creation and, we'll explore the language we use when we speak about God...

# Give thanks for Earth from which each living being rose! Seasons of the Spirit, Resources for 3 September 2023, Season of Creation 2023, p.24

Father and Mother, creator and poet, speaking your wisdom in forest and glade: telling your glory in ocean and river, pouring your pleasure on all you have made.

How do you speak about God?

If I were to ask you to describe God, what would you say?

For many of us, our default is to call God, "Father".

And, indeed, it is Jesus who uses that term frequently when referring to God. Jesus also uses the term "abba" in Mark's gospel (Mark 14:36), an Aramaic term which is closer to "papa" or "dad" and encourages us to think of God in that way.

But it is not the *only* way to think or to speak about God.

First, we need to recognise that while Jesus drew the comparison between God and our earthly fathers, that comparison is not helpful to everyone, particularly those who have experienced a difficult relationship with a father who has been less than we perhaps hoped, or whose father was absent for whatever reason.

We also need to acknowledge that the term "father" is unavoidably gender-specific, and for some that locks God into a form that is unhelpful.

The reading, we have heard from Matthew's gospel invites us to expand our thinking in this space - Jesus refers to himself in the feminine, a hen who gathers her chickens to her to warm and protect them (Matthew 23:37), a mother.

When we sing about the wisdom of God being spoken in "forest and glade", it points to the Hebrew Scriptures. There, when God's wisdom is spoken of, it is again described in feminine form (see, in particular, Proverbs 8), where wisdom calls and raises *her* voice (Proverbs 8:1).

The Hebrew word for the spirit of God, *ruakh*, which also carries the sense or meaning of the wind and breath, is also a feminine word capturing a sense of the divine presence and energy.<sup>1</sup>

Today, there are many who say that to assign God any gender at all reduces God to our human constructs and the construct of our language - and even the song we sang earlier "The Heavens shall declare" includes the descriptor, see the coming of the king, again a term that holds a particular gender and, I might say, a whole system of male leadership and dominion. It limits how we understand the God who is beyond our human societal constructs - but I might say more about that at the end of the month when we look at who we, humans, are created by God to be.

For now, let's notice that when God first speaks to Moses at the burning bush (Exodus 3), God describes God's self simply as "I am" - that's it!, "I am." Nothing more. And one of the names the ancient Hebrew people used for God was a sacred word, almost a whisper, *Yahweh*. Neither of these terms need a gender to shape the God they are describing.

So what are some other words we might use to describe God? Here are some you will have heard me use: Ancient of Days, Creator, Loving Parent, Divine Presence, Eternal Love (with capital "E" and "L"), Wisdom.

Janice has introduce us to the term, "Holy Friend".

The song invites us to consider God as "Creator", alongside "Poet" - perhaps capturing a more artistic, beautiful, sense of creation.

And so how might we be conscious of using a wide range of descriptors - all of which fall short of the completeness of the wonder that is our Creator - but perhaps invite and prompt us to think more broadly about who God is.

The last two lines of the first verse, then, speak of:

telling your glory in ocean and river

Remember, God's *glory* is not some kind of shining light or radiant beam, it is simply a way of indicating God's *presence*. So the oceans and rivers, the forests and glades, speak of God's wisdom and God's presence, they reveal something of God to us.

The psalmist in Psalm 19 tells us that they don't need words like we do - their very being shouts of who God is and of God's presence right here and now - "the heavens are telling the glory of God", shouting to all who have eyes, ears and hearts to hear (Psalm 19:1-4).

And then we are reminded that we are part of this creation - we are part of God's world that speaks of God's wisdom and tells of God's presence without us making a sound... That is, before we have opened our mouths, our being, our living, our presence has already proclaimed something of who God is in the world...

There is something in that that is both deeply comforting - I don't need to have all the right words to say - and deeply challenging - what does my life say about the One who I say I follow?

This verse ends:

pouring your pleasure on all you have made.

God's creation, the forests and oceans and rivers, also remind us of God's pleasure in God's creation: It is good, very good!

And again, I am challenged when I ask, how does my being, my living tell of God's pleasure in God's creation?

So perhaps this week, you might take some time to spend in the wide expanse of God's creation. Perhaps on your daily walk, or when you are sitting in the garden, maybe this week you could make a special effort to stand on the cliffs at Kiama and look out to sea across the vast expanse of ocean and sky, or go for a walk in the rainforest or amongst the valleys and fields in Jamberoo, along the river or the beach - let's face it, we have it all here on our doorstep! - so take some time and wonder, what wisdom can you see, what of God's presence is this environment trying to tell you?

And hear again God's assurance - it is good, very, very good!

And then spend a moment thinking about how you echo that song in your living?

Let's pray,

Father and Mother, Creator and Poet,

draw near to us as we draw near to you.

As we stretch our hearts and minds to understand more of who you are,

compel us into your world and to open our eyes and ears and hearts to what your world is trying to tell us about who you are and who you call us to be.

And then help us to shape our living to sing your song, to shout your praise, in all that we are and all that we do. Amen.

that no-one among us need ever go hungry.

Show us how to soar with the winds of change, like seeds upon the wind that come to rest and sprout into new life.

O God, give us courage to face uncertain futures,

give us wisdom and patience to bring our friends and neighbours along with us.

You bless us with joy in the bird song and laughter in Macaques.

Encourage us to revel in delight with the simple joy of nature all around us.

There is no reason for you to do this but only for sheer joy.

O God, help us find joy in the simple things of life and to share such joy with the people around us.

Look at soil, you knead into your wonder decomposed leaves and branches.

You witness to the power of resurrection in transforming what is dead into the very source of life.
