Reading: Colossians 1:15-20

¹⁵ He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; ¹⁶ for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. ¹⁷ He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. ¹⁸ He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. ¹⁹ For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, ²⁰ and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

Reading: John 3:11-17

- ¹¹ 'Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. ¹²If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? ¹³No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. ¹⁴And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

Reflection

Let us pray...

¹⁶ "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

¹⁷ "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.

(John 3:16-17)

In these verses, the Greek word translated as "world" is $\kappa \delta \sigma \mu o \nu$ (cosmon) from which we get cosmos: God so loved the cosmos that he gave his only Son...in order that the cosmos might be saved through him.

God, the creator of all that we can see and so much more that we are yet to comprehend, loves beyond the reaches of our eyes and minds to the full extent of all that is!

The writer of Colossians, opens the letter with a song of praise to the Christ, "the image of the invisible God... all things have been created through him" (Col 1:15-16) and "in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell" (Col 1:19).

How incredible is it to think of the Creator of the Universe, "coming among us" as we sing in the song, experiencing our life and our death in order to restore us to wholeness of life embraced in the love of our Creator?!

Let me unpack some of this - and, I know, I am only scratching the surface here...

First, for the people of biblical times, the heavens were a mystery that pointed them to the wonder of God. And, now, with the benefit of science, we are able to see so much more clearly how tiny we are in the scheme of the cosmos (have a look at the images coming from the James Webb Telescope: https://www.nasa.gov/content/first-images-from-the-james-webb-space-telescope or the Hubble telescope: https://www.nasa.gov/mission_pages/hubble/main/index.html).

Second, "Christ of the cosmos", or the cosmic Christ is an invitation to contemplate how God is present to us in the world today. Many of us are comfortable speaking of "Jesus Christ", using the term, "Christ" almost as if it is Jesus' surname, rather than the descriptor it really is, "Jesus *the* Christ". That is, the word "Christ" or *Messiah* (often used interchangeably in the gospels) means God's chosen one and is deeply embedded in the Hebrew understanding of God's promises made through the ancient prophets that God's chosen one would one day come to save them. But in understanding the Christ as a descriptor, invites us to draw together the promises spoken by the prophets, with the person of Jesus - the one who was with God in the beginning, now walks among us and whose purpose was to call not just the Hebrew people, but all peoples and, indeed, all of creation to return to God. So to speak of "Jesus Christ" is a short-hand way of drawing together the person of Jesus, the historical figure who walked the earth, fully human; and the Christ, for some, the risen one, the ongoing presence of Jesus in the world, which is somehow the same as the one who was present with the Creator at the beginning of time.

Which brings me to the third aspect which is naming the mystery.

Christ of the cosmos, you sang into being, galaxies spinning through measureless space; coming among us, and sharing our weakness; singing your songs of redemption and grace.

Science tells us something of how the universe was created - and scientists continue to search the height and depths of the heavens to discover more of how it all works and where it all came from.

In our humanity, we know in the depths of our being the power of love to defeat hatred and greed and all that threatens to divide and destroy not only us but the world we inhabit. We know that when people come together, we are always stronger than our individual parts. We know that grace and hope create spaces where people can have the opportunity to choose a different path.

We know that our gathering around this table, nurtures and refreshes us, creating an image, a glimpse of the world in harmony as God intended it to be.

But how it all works, is also an incredible mystery - one that fills us with awe and wonder - if we take the time to stop and think about it.

Here we are, tiny dots of humanity on a tiny planet made of dust and rock and water, spinning through the universe, immeasurable in time and space.

And yet, the Creator of all this, the one who shaped the stars and planets and set them spinning, loves us so much, offers all of God's self in life and death, meets us here in bread and juice, and invites us to participate in the healing of this world, in offering grace, in demanding justice, in loving, and loving and loving some more...

So that's what we are going to sing about now - this God, comes among us, and calls us to be among the people and creation of which we are a part. Let's stand and sing...

Responding

Sing - From Heaven You Came (TIS 256) From heaven you came helpless babe, entered our world your glory veiled; not to be served but to serve, and give your life that we might live.

This is our God, the Servant King, he calls us now to follow him, to bring our lives as a daily offering of worship to the Servant King.

There in the garden of tears, my heavy load he chose to bear; his heart with sorrow was torn, "Yet not my will, but yours," he said. This is our God...

Come see his hands and his feet, the scars that speak of sacrifice, hands that flung stars into space to cruel nails surrendered.

This is our God...

So let us learn how to serve and in our lives enthrone him; each other's needs to prefer, for it is Christ we're serving. This is our God...

In our congregation we need more people to step up to take on empty roles as our members age and suffer from illnesses. We have that chance as the Congregational Meeting is close. Thank you for all members who work so hard to keep things going and link us to our community.

You know us so well. Listen the deepest yearnings we have and encourage and comfort us. In Jesus' name, Amen.
