This week, it would be appropriate to find a white or gold cloth or scarf for this special celebration.


Take some deep breaths as you gather your thoughts towards God.

Prayer of Praise and Confession

As people who admit to such failure,

today we seek to be challenged to do better.

Accepting of your unwearying grace and mercy,

we are humbled and left with such a gratitude,

that we are ready to mend our ways and

be more ready to live by the example of your son,

who taught us about the true meaning of friendship,

and so discover what it takes to be completely

at one with you and all your people.

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Listening for God's Voice

Reading: John 15:9-17

[Jesus continues talking with his disciples...]

⁹As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. ¹⁰If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. ¹¹I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.

¹² 'This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. ¹³No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. ¹⁴You are my friends if you do what I command you. ¹⁵I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. ¹⁶You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. ¹⁷I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.

For the Word of God in Scripture, for the Word of God among us, for the Word of God within us.

Reflection

God of Love, draw near to us now as we draw near to you. May our ears and minds be open to your leading, may our hearts be soft and willing to change, and may our hands be strong and willing to work for the coming of your realm amongst us. Amen. What does it mean to be a friend?

Listen again to what Jesus says about friendship:

- 12 'This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you.
- ¹³ No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends.
- ¹⁴ You are my friends if you do what I command you. ¹⁵I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends. (15:12-15)

Love one another - being prepared to offer all of ourselves for the sake of another. But what does that mean?

Perhaps I should start with what it doesn't mean - I don't think that Jesus is asking us to place ourselves in situations that are abusive or to work in ways that are unhealthy and unsustainable. Sometimes love is deeply costly, but there is a difference between the choice to offer ourselves to another in love and service, and finding ourselves in a situation or in circumstances that are abusive.

That is partly what Jesus says when he says, we are friends, not servants. We are not compelled by anyone else to do anything we don't want to do - no-one is forcing us and no-one ought to be standing over us telling us to do more or to love more.

But what does it mean to offer all of ourselves for the sake of another? First, whatever we choose to do, is motivated by love - and a reflection of the love Jesus has shown us.

In Paul's reckoning in his letter to the Corinthians, love is patient and kind. Love bears, believes, hopes and endures. "Love never ends." (1 Corinthians 13:4-8)

As Jesus speaks to his disciples for the last time before he is arrested, he reminds them, he reminds us, that we are chosen and appointed to bear fruit in the world that will last. We are chosen and sent to love - because fruit that lasts, is love that never ends.

"Abide in my love" (John 15:9) and "Love one another as I have loved you" (15:12). These are more than a commandment - it is an invitation to a way of being. Shape your living, your life in my love.

Know first that you, yourself, are loved.

Immerse yourself in the stories of Jesus, in the Scriptures that are a constant reminder of God's love for the world. Allow that love to transform your being and your living.

Immerse yourself in the Christian community who, though flawed, do try to show God's love in our life together. This is where we get to practice love - to ask questions and to take risks and to learn how to live together with all the richness of our differences, to disagree in a healthy way and yet to honour and value each precious child of God who gathers.

And then reflect the love you know to the world you encounter.

Because when we hold back, we limit the way of God in the world. The new relationship with God that Jesus announces and points to, is about shared participation and responsibility - friends, not servants - people who share life together, people who share love together.

When we hold back, we are holding back on the engagement with another that God seeks with and for us.

So - be the person who shows up or calls or sends a text when you know someone is struggling.

Be the person who speaks up when a racist joke is told or a woman is spoken down to.

Be the person who intervenes when you see injustice.

Be the person who crosses the street to help someone out.

In the story of the young sparrow, the man and the sparrow are both broken - as we all are in some way. But they find each other - they *notice* one another. And even though they are broken, they are able to offer love - in food and companionship - to one another. Sometimes it is our very brokenness, our own scars, that enables us to engage with the hurt or struggle of another.

Who do you need to *notice* today?

Who is God's Spirit prompting you to be a friend to?

Let us pray...

Jesus, you ask us to "Go and bear fruit",

and we commit ourselves to that simple and profound task:

to befriend others,

to welcome the ones on the edges,

to reconcile the ones who have been outcast,

to build bridges of care and concern.

Use us, our God,

use who we are,

and all that we bring,

that we can bear fruit in your name. Amen.
